

Automobile Overturned in Westery

Occupants Were Out on Joy Ride—Westerly Woman in Germany—Postoffice Employees Enjoy Annual Outing—Pleasant View Campers Banquet.

Residents in the vicinity of Granite, Spruce and Chestnut streets were aroused from peaceful slumber at four o'clock Saturday morning by the smashing of glass and two reports that sounded as loud as the discharge of a big Roman gun in the early morning stillness. Then came groaning and loud talk and men rushed out to ascertain the cause of the unusual commotion in that usually quiet neighborhood. They found an automobile lying on its side on the sidewalk in front of the Carmichael residence, and beside it a colored man and two colored women, who appeared frightened beyond explanation. In a very short while quite a crowd of neighbors had collected and it was learned that the loud reports were caused by the bursting of two tires and that the smashed glass was the wind shield of the automobile.

Police officers and Dyer arrived in about five minutes and the facts in the case were disclosed. Henry E. Fleming, chauffeur for Harry M. Canby, a lumber dealer of Westery, Delaware, with summer home at Mystic, had taken the automobile, without leave, and went to Narragansett Pier on Sunday. Fleming, with him Annie Sebastian and Abbie Perry of Westery, and William Brown of Stonington, but Brown was not of the party on the return. The automobile was abandoned on the sidewalk back to the garage before daylight, and in so doing did not observe the speed limit. Even in coming down Quarry hill he said he was speeding along at a twenty-five mile clip. On nearing Chestnut street the automobile skidded, turned completely around, bounded over the curbing onto the sidewalk, struck the curbing in front of the Carmichael residence and overturned. The automobile top was in place and that probably prevented serious injury to the occupants of the car. All were thrown out but the Perry woman was the only one seriously injured, her right shoulder being dislocated, the others escaping with slight cuts and bruises. Dr. Pagan attended the injured woman, after which she and her female companion went to their homes.

Fleming, the chauffeur disappeared into Spruce street where he was found hiding behind a tree by Police men Ferguson and Dyer. He was arrested and taken to the police station. At first it was thought that he was charged with taking the automobile without the permission of the owner, but finally made complete speed limit. He was arraigned before Judge Oliver H. Williams in the Third District court Saturday evening and costs, which was paid by Mr. Canby, Fleming agreeing to work out the sum paid and also the cost of repairing the automobile.

The damaged automobile was towed to the Holdridge garage for repairs. Aside from the return of the broken wind shield, the damage was a broken steering gear and forward and rear axle bent and a twisted mud guard. The car was connected with registry plate 2241, and Fleming's driver license number is 32541.

Miss Katherine Frankenstein, was heard from in Westery, where she had been taking a summer course of study at the Marburg university, and she was when last heard from. Her mother, Mrs. Frankenstein, and family and her many friends, are anxious as to her whereabouts and safety. Mrs. Frankenstein received a letter from her daughter dated at Marburg, July 27, and arriving in Westery, August 5, reaching this country on the Kaiser Wilhelm II. In the letter Miss Frankenstein stated that she was seeking passage by the North German Lloyd line. She also requested that money be sent her, but as all efforts to locate her up to the present time have failed, it is impossible to send her financial assistance.

The annual outing of the employees of the Westery postoffice was held at Barnes grove, Brightman's pond, Sunday, and the party numbered about 75, half being mailmen from Norwich and 16 coming from New London.
