POST CARDS THAT SHOW CAPE COD CANAL. Exhibit Made at Otis Library Through Loan by Miss Virginia Hall.

A set of post cards put on exhibition at the Otis library has attracted a little attention.

The cards which are loaned by Miss Virginia Hall, are upon the digging and the opening of the Cape Cod canal which was formally opened the 29th of July last.

The cards include pictures of both the digging and of the finished canal, of the procession of floats at the opening which was led by the steamer "Rose Standish" on January 29, 1914.

There is a picture of Governor Walsh speaking at the opening exercises and one of Gov. Walsh and August Belmont together.

An attractive poster in the center of the group of cards is like those used to announce the Cape Cod canal project. It is dated August 15th, 17th, 18th and 19th.

The present given by the natives in which 500 persons took part was held on the bank of the canal and was a magnificent spectacular history of the opening and the canal told in both song and dance.

MAKING GOOD PROGRESS ON STEAMSHIP TERMINAL. Between 85 and 99 Per Cent. of the Piling Has Been Done.

The State Steamship terminal at East New London is daily growing nearer completion as far as the substructure is concerned. It is estimated that 85 per cent. of the crated piles have been driven to 99 per cent. of the ordinary supporting piles. If these were placed end to end they would cover a distance of 23 miles, a considerable distance from New London to Willimantic.

Dredging in front of the pier has been completed to the extent of about 80 per cent. About 1000 cubic feet of frame work is finished. The granite bulkhead walls are laid and the granite walls which will enclose the filled area of the pier, extending 1000 feet into the river, are well along. The fill area is 100 feet in width. Fifty feet on either side of this is of crotoned pile construction, reinforced with wire mesh. The latter material is not being placed between the piles at the river bottom.
