COOPS WITH FANCY POULTRY

Exhibit Under the Grand Stand is Notable for Quantity and Quality.

The collection of poultry, pigeons and other birds, which has been on display in the exhibition hall under the grandstand, is a record breaker in quantity, but quality and if the increase in this line of exhibition keeps growing in the forthcoming year, it will have to be made to accommodate the cacklers.

In all there are between 350 and 400 coops of the highest standard and they have been comfortably accommodated by Woodbury O. Rogers, who has charge of this department.

Among the magnificent collections are hens, ducks, pigeons, geese, turkeys and guinea hens. There is also a fine collection of rabbits and an added feature, a cage of white rats that are attracting much attention. The guinea hens this year are of the most varied sort in color, white, black, red, cream and brindle.

A brood of young chicks with their mother is the chief attraction for the young people who take delight in watching the movements of these small pips of yearlings. Among the chicken stock are found Barred White, Buff Plymouth Rocks, White and Buff Wyandottes, Single Comb and Rose Comb Rhode Island Reds, White and Buff Orpingtons, Cochins, Brahmas, Leghorns, Anconas, Houdans, Mantans.

Several broods of chickens with mothers are made their share of noise with their continuous peeping. The guinea pigs, of various colors, with Belgian hares and Blue Imperial rabbits were greatly admired.
