VARIOUS MATTERS
Snapper blues in large quantities are being caught at Saybrook Point. The houses in Thamesville village are being repaired and put in order. It is stated that \$1,228 gate money was taken at the North Stonington fair. The mails were increased Monday by greeting cards for the Jewish New Year. Bushnell pond, near the Uncoa Paper company's plant, is lower than it has been for years. The wind Monday, Sept. 21, is supposed to be the prevailing wind for the next three months. Farmers are hoping the line storm will arrive on time, to wet up the dry fields and pastures. The nasturtiums and other flowers near the North station continue to bloom thrifty, untouched by frost. According to Washington despatches the New London harbor appropriation was reduced from \$70,000 to \$70,000 in a committee amendment. An important conference of Kings' Daughters officers will be held in Norwich tomorrow to arrange for the state convention at Waterbury. The E. Y. P. U. meeting at the Central Baptist church Sunday evening was led by Harry J. Schulman. The topic was "Share your blessings". Invitations are out for the wedding of Miss Helen S. Leonard of Uxbridge and Randall S. Carpenter of New York, which is to take place Sept. 28. The Feather, Fur and Fin Club held its annual opening at the Gun club in Waterford Saturday evening, devouring a 12-pound oon which had been killed by Frederick Hawthorn, Daniel Phillips and William Maroney. When the Thompson family association members met at the Uxbridge Congregational church Saturday for their seventh biennial reunion 225 persons of all ages sat down to dinner at 12.30 in the dining room of the church. The bishops of the Episcopal church, desiring a uniform peace service for Sunday Oct. 4, to comply with President Wilson's recommendation, have agreed to use the service formulated by Bishop Doane for churches in the New York diocese. The funeral of Edward R. Parker was held Sunday at Gates Ferry at 2.30. Rev. Dirk Van der Voet of the Poquonoc Bridge Baptist church conducted the service in the absence of Rev. Mr. Harrison of Gates Ferry. Burial was at Gates Ferry. John H. Smith 65, of Old Lyme died suddenly at his home at 11 o'clock Saturday morning of apoplexy. For the past eight years Mr. Smith has been employed by J. M. Caulfield at the Old Lyme Inn. He is survived by his wife and four children. A reception was held Monday night for several officers of the supreme and grand lodge of the New England Order of Protection at the home of Mrs. M. Boye, 228 of New London, the guests including Grand Trustee James L. Wheeler, formerly of this city. Connecticut is the 17th state of the union in the matter of postal savings banks according to a statement from the postoffice department. The balance on deposit in the postal bank in Connecticut at the close of the fiscal year June 30 last was \$683,833. The appointment of students in this diocese to colleges and seminaries include John J. LAFAYETTE MAIN ACCUSED NEGRO OF THEFT
Robert E. Young Bound Over For Superior Court Trial.
Robert E. Young a negro 22 years of age, was bound over to the criminal superior court Saturday afternoon charged with theft from Lafayette Main of North Stonington. In default of \$500 bonds Young was committed to the county jail at Norwich. Saturday morning Deputy Sheriff J. H. Bubbs of New London received a telephone call from Main saying that he had arrested a burglar. The deputy sheriff immediately went to North Stonington and took charge of the prisoner. Young was brought before Justice of the Peace Charles E. Chapman on a warrant sworn to by Grand Juror Edgar W. Chapman on the charge of stealing a gold watch, a pocketbook and a bunch of keys from Main. Young pleaded not guilty. He testified that he had taken the watch and other articles in payment for wages due him. He said that Main had refused to pay him two weeks wages, because he broke a gun owned by Main, so Friday, while his employer was away, he went into the house to look for his suit case to leave. He saw the watch and pocketbook in the house and took them. Main testified that he went away Friday and left the house in charge of a hired man to whom he gave the keys telling him not to let Young into the house. Young succeeded in getting the keys and entering the house, stealing the watch and pocketbook. The justice found probable cause for holding Young and fixed the bonds at \$500, which he was unable to furnish and went to jail.

Mrs. Albert G. Brewster Brings Suit in Superior Court—On New Policy Her Husband Took Out Two Days Before His Sudden Death in Jewett City on July 10th—Had Paid Only First Semi-Annual Payment on \$1,000 Policy.
In a suit brought against the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., in which the papers were filed on Monday with Clerk Parsons of the superior court, Mrs. Y. Brewster, beneficiary under an insurance policy held by her husband, the late Albert G. Brewster of Jewett City, seeks to collect the policy of \$1,000. In the complaint it is stated that Mr. Brewster died on July 10, 1914 and that two days before then, on July 8, he had taken out a 15 payment life insurance policy for \$1,000 on which he had made the first semi-annual payment of \$21.41 on July 8, 1914. The policy was to mature July 8, 1923, when \$1,000 was to be paid to Mr. Brewster if then living, or the same sum was to be paid to his wife in the event of his death before the 15 years had expired. The plaintiff claims that although she paid only the first semi-annual payment, the insurance had been paid, and she is entitled to the full amount of the policy.
