THE KALEIDOSCOPE. Britain has 1,568 co-operative societies with a total membership of 9,511,390. New Brunswick has 17,393,000 acres of land, of which only 1,474,076 acres are cleared. Baskets are used a great deal by the German army for carrying shells and cartridges.

The United States in the last fiscal year sold 7,222 autos, valued at \$5,853,127 to Britain. Uruguay, much of which was formerly treeless, within a few years has planted more than 17,000,000 forest trees. Insurance against hailstorms in France amounts to about \$200,000,000 a year and in Germany \$725,000,000.

The forists of New York are said to be losing \$5,000 a day because of the war, as there are no orders for steamer bouquets. Seth Low, the new head of New York's Chamber of Commerce, fills a position to which his father was elected 50 years ago.

One thousand five hundred persons are killed a year, and five thousand are injured each year as a result of fires in the United States. The Philippine Bureau of Forestry reports that American and European lumbermen are trying to procure large and regular supplies of Philippine woods, mainly for cabinet-making.

Trade of the United States with other American countries in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1914, aggregated \$1,303,000,000, or 33 per cent, below the high record of 1913, and constituted 30 per cent, of the entire commerce handled by domestic ports. Of this large New World commerce \$956,000,000 was with North America and \$347,000,000 with South America.

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
