Welsh returned to his corner with his right arm limp at his side. The referee examined the injury and stopped the bout.

Wolgast had the advantage. In the third Welsh jabbed and hooked his left to the face, side-stepping so cleverly that many of Wolgast's swings were wild.

During the seventh round it was seen that Wolgast was not using his right hand, and in the eighth Welsh gave him a hard drubbing, hooking and jabbing his left to the face and crossing his right time and again to the face.

When Harvard came within an ace of going down before the Pennsylvania State eleven, while Princeton was handing out a beating to the strong Dartmouth combination it began to look as if the tigers were on the line for the highest honors in the east.

More than 61,000 seats have been already constructed and are ready for use. About 9,000 more will be built during the winter months.

The Yale Bowl will be ready for the first sunken stadium, accommodating about 12,000 people and making it possible to accommodate 60,000 people in the new stadium.

Till the present time not more than 20,000 seats in this country. The colossal task undertaken by Yale in constructing the first sunken stadium in America, and allowing 61,000 people to see the game, drew the attention of athletic field owners the world over.

The sudden task which the Yale authorities have undertaken in pledging themselves to build 9,000 seats in three weeks, is another chapter of the onerous task which has been drawn to a close when the Yale-Harvard game is played here November 21.

The Bowl will be at the disposal of the Harvard team in case they wish to use it for practice any afternoon from the present time till the date of the game and it is expected that the Harvard backs will spend two or three afternoons here getting used to the peculiarities of the structure.
