SICK CHINAMAN WORRIES DOLLAR STEAMSHIP CO. Must Be Watched in New London Hospital-Might Enter the Country Unlawfully.

Tang Sul, a Chinaman, is the cause of much concern to both the Dollar Steamship company and the United States bureau of immigration. Seaman Sul is the master of the steamer Robert Dollar who was taken to Memorial hospital at New London Sunday suffering from an abscess.

The Dollar Steamship company has given a bond of \$500, which would be forfeited if Tang Sul entered the country in violation of the customs laws. The steamship company does not care about leaving Tang Sul at New London and has no desire to forfeit the surety it gives for him.

Deputy Collector Comstock, in charge of the New London custom house, took up on Wednesday the matter of Tang Sul. It is probable that the bureau will send a special agent to keep tabs on Sul. Meanwhile he is flat on his back in a hospital cot and there is no danger of his being able to move several days. If he is well enough when the company's ship, Helen Dollar, now on her way to New York to discharge her cargo, enters the country of the company will escort him there and turn him over to the master of the vessel.

Although some of the Dollar's Chinamen were allowed shore leave at New London, only those got ashore who could be depended on to return to the vessel. They were ashore for a short time and closely tabbed while they visited the city by officers of the Dollar.
