SENTENCE FOR CAPT. CROWLEY

New London Man Pleads Guilty to Liquor Law Violation—Execution of Sentence Suspended by Judge Waller in Common Pleas—New Haven Firm Suing Norwich Saloon Keeper—He Denies Liability for the Bill.

A session of the criminal court of common pleas was held in Taftville morning with Judge C. B. Waller on the bench. Capt. Daniel P. Crowley of New London was before the court on the charge of selling liquor without a license in New London.

The criminal court was in session only a few minutes. This was followed by civil matters and the case of George W. Carroll vs Town of Plainfield was allowed to go off the trial list.

For the trial of Remi Gouvin against Philip Frabouze, which was a contest over a right of way in Baltic and breach of the peace, a jury was chosen, but after the attorneys had impaled for half an hour, the court was informed that the jury had been selected.

Judgment per stipulations was given in the case of Charles C. Avery against Charles White, which concerned cutting timber on land in Bozrah. The case had been in court for a number of years and had also been to the supreme court.

After the evidence by the plaintiff and the attorney in the case was heard, the jury for the defendant moved for a non-suit which he argued before Judge Waller.
