TWO COURTS IN SESSION HERE

Argument Reached in Superior Court in \$10,000 Suit for Death After Auto Accident—Sheep Killing by Dogs Occupies Common Pleas Court—Town of Sprague Denies Liability and Disputes Claims of Plaintiff.

As on Wednesday, two courts were in session here in the courthouse all day Thursday, the superior court with Judge M. A. Shumway and a jury in the superior court upstairs and the common pleas court with Judge B. Waller and a jury in the court room downstairs.

In the superior court the case on trial was the \$10,000 damage suit brought by Charles E. Webber of New London, administrator of the estate of Charles H. Kinck and others of the same city for the death of Mr. Webber's four year old son, who was fatally hurt when he was struck on Nov. 20, 1913, by an automobile delivery wagon driven by an employee of Mr. Kinck. During Thursday afternoon the arguments were partly made in the afternoon. Ernest C. Opperman, attorney for the plaintiff, and Attorney Tracy Waller for the defendant. They occupied the rest of the court time until adjournment at 4.30. By that time Mr. Waller had not quite concluded.

Judge Shumway directed that the arguments be concluded at 10 o'clock for a short calendar session. Witnesses for the plaintiff were George E. Kinck, Frank P. D'Avignon, Wilbur F. Lewis, P. J. LeVone, Ernest C. Opperman, William A. Lewis, Edward W. O'Connor, Jules A. Racine and Roy R. Palmer.

Of the artistic and original work of a Norwich jeweler who recently exhibited at the Norwich Art school Friday's New York Times said: "An artist who decides to use colored stones instead of clear ones is not the less an artist, and Frank Hale, whose jewelry is on view at the Ehrlich galleries for the next fortnight, uses color with an exquisite sense of its possibilities.
