ISBELL WANTS EXPERT ON TAXATION

Assist the Finance Committee in an Effort to Increase the Income of the State—Resolution Passed in the House.

(Special to The Bulletin.) Hartford, Feb. 2.—In the house today Chairman Milton E. Isbell of the finance committee set out to railroad a resolution to permit his committee to employ an expert to assist the committee in the increase of the income of the state, a work requiring an expert on taxation.

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Notes. The ballot in the house for the reelection of Judge Albert T. Rogers to the supreme and superior court was unanimous as was also the vote re-electing Judge William H. Bennett to the superior court.

There will be a hearing Thursday afternoon before the appropriations committee on the resolution making appropriation for the Norwich State hospital.

Next Tuesday afternoon the committee on federal relations will give a hearing on the resolution recommending an amendment to the constitution of the United States concerning polygamy, presented by Mr. Wilson of Stouffville.

An act authorizing the city of New London to issue refunding bonds, presented by Senator Whitton, will be given a hearing by the finance committee Thursday afternoon.

ALIENS MAY OWN LAND IN STATE OF OREGON

Resolution for Constitutional Amendment Forbidding It Was Defeated Unanimously.

Salem, Oregon, Feb. 2.—A resolution providing that a constitutional amendment making it unlawful for aliens to own land in the state be submitted to a vote of the people was defeated by the Oregon house of representatives today. The vote against the measure was almost unanimous.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT ON WAR MEASURES.

London, Feb. 2, 5:55 p. m.—Premier Asquith presented a resolution in the house of commons today to devote the present session entirely to government measures.

ALLEGED CONSPIRACY TO PROFIT BY BANKRUPTCY

It is Claimed a Chain of Stores Was Established in Various Cities for That Purpose.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 2.—The origin of the alleged conspiracy by which a chain of stores was established in various cities for the purpose of profiting by going into bankruptcy was told in the federal district here today by Charles L. Greenfield, one of the men indicted in the so-called "million dollar swindle" and who has turned witness for the government.

The plan was organized in Carlisle, Pa., he said, on the eve of his failure in business there in a conference with Greenfield, Sam Brown, Adolph Muscovitz and Meyer Rotman. Brown and Rotman had been associated with Greenfield in Philadelphia, he said, and when they failed they concealed \$4,650 worth of merchandise from the bankruptcy trustees. They moved this merchandise to Carlisle, where they organized another store.

The Carlisle store failed, Greenfield stated, and then they started in St. Louis. Muscovitz wanted to run the business honestly and when his partners refused to incorporate to make this possible, he withdrew from the firm.

APPEAL FOR RELIEF OF DESTITUTE IN PALESTINE

Jewish Societies of New York and Christians Have Formed a Committee.

New York, Feb. 3.—Announcement was made tonight that officers of various Jewish societies in New York and Christian missionary organizations have formed a committee to appeal for funds for the relief of the destitute inhabitants of Palestine, Syria and adjacent regions.

Cattle Quarantine in Oklahoma. Oklahoma City, Okla., Feb. 3.—Oklahoma was quarantined today against livestock from all states except Texas and New Mexico. The state board of agriculture ordered the quarantine effect immediately to guard against the spread of foot and mouth disease lately discovered in southern Kansas counties.
