American Students in German Universities Are Recalled.



PAID \$133.00. Eugene Gaumont Violated Liquor Laws and Sold to Black-listed Man.

Before Judge M. H. Geisler in the city court Thursday morning Eugene Gaumont pleaded guilty to two counts of selling clear illegally and to another count charging him with dealing intoxicants to a man on the black-list.

On the additional counts Judge Geisler imposed a fine of \$50 for each count and \$25 additional fine for delivering to a man on the black-list, which with the costs of prosecution, makes a total of \$133.00, which Gaumont paid.

Two other men are held at the police station, but were not put in the dock Thursday, so the charges against them are not known. They are Edmund Dayleian, a man on the black-list, and Peter Beausoleil. They will be presented in court this morning.

EQUAL FRANCHISE BANNER Displayed Thursday, Bearing Portrait of Lincoln—League to Observe the Day.

A large net banner bearing a portrait of Abraham Lincoln, accredited with being the greatest American suffragist, was suspended across Main street at the Union block Thursday afternoon and on this anniversary of the martyr's death attracted special attention to the day observed. The banner is painted by the Hon. Thomas J. Thompson, chairman of the Equal Franchise League, which has arranged to hold Lincoln day exercises in Old Fellows' hall this evening.

Rev. A. H. Wilhee, pastor of the Methodist church at Moscow, better known here, where a few years ago he was in charge of the Salvation Army, as Captain Wilhee, presided over the address. The program arranged includes patriotic music.

Sure of Favorable Legislation. Mrs. W. J. Bartlett, Mrs. Marshall Kenyon, Mrs. Grace Nicoloff, Miss Abbie McKenna, Mrs. J. B. Tatem, Jr., Miss Rosemond Danielson and Mrs. William Valentine, Pomfret, the Putnam Equal Franchise League's delegation to Hartford to interview members of the general assembly relative to the plan to amend the constitution of the state so as to provide equal suffrage rights for men and women, returned here Thursday evening. The prospect that favorable action will be taken on this matter at this session, it is stated by the members of the delegation that the local delegation received a great many pledges of support, so many that there seems well founded reason for believing that the legislature will vote to put the equal franchise plan up to the voters of the state for decision next fall at the elections. Numerous members of the legislature not only promised their support, but also went to seek the support of other legislators for the measure.

Windham county has some ardent equal suffrage members of the legislature and the delegates believe, when a real test on this great issue is to be made in Connecticut.

Grange members in numbers in Windham county towns are pledging their support to equal suffrage. Mrs. W. J. Bartlett spoke at the meeting of Putnam grange here this week and afterwards secured the name of every one present in the meeting as well as a petition to the legislature in behalf of suffrage rights for women. At the meeting of Wolf Den grange at Abington Thursday evening Mrs. Bartlett delivered another address and secured as signatures to her petition.

MARRIED AT 16. Now A. D. Sedar Seeks Divorce from Young Wife in Worcester Court.

Bright dreams of childhood, for they could not have been much more than that, have been shattered for A. D. Sedar of Worcester, who in the superior court in that city is seeking a divorce from the girl-pretty Mary Gately, whom he married in this city just a little over two years ago—January 6, 1913.

According to a published account of the trial, Sedar told the court he was 17 1/2 years of age when he married here, just a few weeks more than two years ago. He has grown younger, notwithstanding his marital troubles, since his wedding day. His marriage license on file in the office of Town Clerk David Flagg, here, shows that he claimed to be 21, as he was to do in order to get the license, when he made oath to the statements the document contains.

In court Sedar testified that he worked for a time after his marriage for a sewing-machine company and that he turned his wages over to his wife, and later that he had a disagreement with her about his working and that she told him "if you don't work, get out of here," and he said he left.

Sedar claimed that his wife became intoxicated about twice a week and that she was about 18 when they were married here. She drank most of the time, he charged, and he left her during the first year of their marriage and went to live with his folks. He also told the court that his wife had him arrested once for non-support. Mr. Sedar also charged his wife with adultery, in court she denied each charge and that of intoxication. Decision in the case was reserved by the court.

OBITUARY. Augustus Irving Morse.

Augustus Irving Morse, one of the best known cotton manufacturers in New England, died at his home on Sunny Side this city at 2 o'clock Thursday morning after a lingering illness.

Mr. Morse was born in Providence, December 21, 1850, the first son of George A. and Melora Whitney Morse, and was therefore a little over 55 years of age.
