# TIREN COMMON PLEAS COURT

### Suit for Rent of a Hall in Montville—Rent for 27 Months is Claimed—Judge Waller Hands Down Decisions in Norwich and New London Case.

In the court of common pleas here on Monday with Judge C. B. Waller presiding, the case of the estate of George H. Stanton, administrator of the estate of his sister, Ardelia G. Walden, against Orville C. Walden was on trial.

About a dozen witnesses were heard and after the arguments had been made the judge took the papers. The case was argued on May 8, 1914. It is alleged she owned a hall in Montville and Orville C. Walden hired it at \$10 per month and he failed to pay the rent for 27 months, and that sum is sought with interest and costs. The lawyers were John H. Barnes, A. J. Bailey and C. Stewart.

The court will come in again in New London on Feb. 22.

### Decisions by Judge Waller.

Two decisions on cases tried before him have been handed down by Judge Waller.

In the case of Salvatore Malozzi vs. George H. Stanton and others, judgment was rendered that the plaintiffs cover the sum of \$677.55 from Deputy Sheriff Stanton and Scaramelli & Co. of Boston.

Deputy Sheriff Stanton is covered by a bond in the matter which he insisted should be given by the Boston firm before he went ahead and levied upon the property in question, as he knew there was a previous attachment ahead of their action. The legal adviser of the Boston firm assumed him to go ahead, claiming that he could prove fraud.

The court finds that the goods were worth more than the debt and they were not advertised as the law directs before the sale.

The court finds the property worth \$100.

It is also found that Scaramelli & Co. authorized the officer to act in levying upon and seizing the property of the plaintiff under claim it was the property of Frank Malozzi.

The property in question was the stock in a grocery store on Franklin street that was taken for debt, and it was claimed the place was illegally sold by Frank Malozzi to the plaintiff, Salvatore Malozzi.

### Judgment for Plaintiff.

In the case of Louis Anderson of New London against Jerome Collins of New London a bill for repairs on a motor boat, judgment for the plaintiff is given in the sum of \$112.23.

### HIS 91ST BIRTHDAY.


Sherman Loomis of Franklin is hale and hearty on the Anniversary.
