

MORE JUDGES ELECTED BY HOUSE

In Senate There Was Less Than a Quorum, But a Fifteen Minute Session Was Held.

Hartford, Feb. 19.—The senate had less than a quorum present today but the question was not raised a 15 minute session was held.

IN THE SENATE

(Special to The Bulletin.) Hartford, Feb. 19.—Seventeen of the thirty-five senators, or one less than a quorum, attended the first Friday session of the senate.

Unfavorable Reports. The education committee made unfavorable reports on the bill providing a written examination for children under 12 years of age.

New Incorporations. These matters came from the committee on incorporations favorably reported and were tabled for calendar.

Calendar Cleared. These matters on the calendar ready for action were passed without opposition.

IN THE HOUSE (Special to The Bulletin.) Hartford, Feb. 19.—Speaker Healy called the house to order at 11:45 for the first Friday meeting of the present session.

Hearings in the House. Resolutions were adopted permitting the use of the hall of the house of representatives for hearings as follows:

Unfavorable Reports. Judiciary Appointing John Tette judge of the Norwich court, resolution rejected; bill to change term of office of town clerks from two to four years, rejected.

Forfeited Rights Restored. The rules were suspended and rights forfeited by crime were restored to Theodore Gentry of Greenwich, Dennis J. Dillon of Bridgeport and George S. Wilson of Stamford.

ing of smelt in Palmer's cove, Pequonnock river, and Baker's cove in the town of Groton. This act amends chapter 73 of the public acts of 1913 and provides that no person shall take, assist in taking, or attempt to take any smelt from the waters named, or their tributaries in the town of Groton by means of a net, seine, or trap, except during the months of November, December and January.

Judgeships Considered. Resolutions were taken from the calendar and passed on these court matters: Appointing John R. Booth, judge of the city court of Danbury; Herbert S. Bullard, recorder of the city court of Hartford; appointing Samuel A. Davis, associate judge of the city court of Danbury; Frederick A. Bartlett, judge of the city court of Bridgeport; George E. Hall, judge of the city court of New Haven.

Taking of Land. An act concerning the taking of land by towns was taken from the calendar and passed. The act provides that when any town shall vote to acquire land within its limits for the purpose of obtaining material for the construction, grading, repair or improvement of public highways or bridges within such town and cannot obtain such land by agreement with the owner thereof, it may take the same for such purposes in the manner provided by section 4196 of the general statutes, provided no land occupied for church or cemetery purposes shall be taken under the provisions of this act.

Inspection of Milk. There was taken from the calendar and passed an act concerning the adulteration and inspection and sale of milk. It provides that no person shall sell or exchange, or have in his possession with intent to sell or exchange, any milk or cream which has been subjected to the action of heat commonly known as "pasteurization," unless the receipt in which the same is contained is plainly labeled with the date of the day of the week of pasteurization.

Insurance of Livestock. The act concerning insurance of livestock and other domestic animals was passed, after being taken from the calendar and passed with the insurance companies that insure against loss by accident, or death of livestock and domestic animals, and for expenses of veterinary services, shall maintain a premium reserve on all policies in force, whether issued in this state or elsewhere, equal to the unearned portion of the premium charged for covering the risks.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES. Senator Hewitt, chairman of the committee on banks, favors the consolidation of the bank and building and loan companies, in line with the recommendations of the governor.

At the request of Representative McDonald, the hearing scheduled for Friday in the act concerning payments for support of Winham County Law Library was continued.

The bill for an appropriation for publication of Legislative History and Souvenir was given hearing Friday afternoon. Explanation of the bill was made by William H. Taylor and he submitted a strong letter from State Librarian Godard in favor of the publication.

The judiciary committee made no report on the resolution appointing a judge and deputy judge for the city court of Norwich, Friday, as is the custom on such cases. A member of the committee said this matter was considered at the executive session on Thursday evening.

DEFENSE OF MASTER PLUMBERS' ASSOCIATION. Eight Witnesses Testify It Existed Only For Betterment of Sanitary Conditions.

Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 19.—Eight witnesses testifying for the defense in the trial of the 36 master plumbers charged with violating the Sherman law, told the jury in the federal court here today that the National Association of Master Plumbers of America was an organization existing only to improve plumbing and sanitary conditions throughout the country.

H. L. Wood, Sioux City manager for a Chicago supply house, said he had never been informed by the association of its members and that his company's business had never been injured as the result of reported boycotts. On cross examination, however, he admitted that "complaints might have been made" and his "business might have been injured," without the fact becoming known to him.
