HOW PROBATION WORKS. Shown in Report of Connecticut Prison Association—4,096 on Probation in 1914.

The report of the Connecticut Prison association to the governor for the past two fiscal years has been printed for distribution.

The report contains statistics relating to the operation of the probation law. There are sixty-seven probation officers in the state. The following table shows the number of persons placed on probation in Connecticut during the two years:

During the two years the probation officers throughout the state collected from probationers \$67,870, and \$30,651 in fines and costs. The salaries received by the officers for the two years amounted to \$50,034.34, and their expenses to \$1,565.45.
