TOLD STORY OF HEROIC NEWSBOY. Rev. Dr. Stocum Depicted the Sacrifice of Cheerful Billy Rugh.

Billy Rugh, The Hero of Gary, Indiana, was the topic upon which Rev. Dr. Stocum, D. D., pastor of the Central Baptist church, spoke at the shop talk held Tuesday noon at the Cuthbert plant, under Y. M. C. A. auspices.

One morning in Gary, a little over two years ago, Rev. Dr. Stocum said it was announced from a hospital that "cheerful" Billy Rugh, a crippled newsboy, was dead and Mayor Thomas E. Knott at once appointed a committee to raise funds for the funeral.

It was held in one of the largest churches and the crowd packed the church and overflowed into the street. A leading clergyman preached the sermon, a Masonic lodge provided a band and the floral tributes were numerous.

When the newspapers learned the facts and told the story, people by the hundreds and thousands awoke to the realization that the date of his death was not passed. In his proclamation the mayor said:

The name of William Rugh should be remembered in Gary as long as the city shall last. The hearts of all are torn today as we realize that his act of noble heroism, his unselfish willingness to suffer for the good of his fellow citizens, has culminated in the supreme sacrifice.
