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AGAINST A SEASIDE SANATORIUM

Adversely Reported in House by Humane Institutions Committee—Substitute Bill Concerning Baseball Pools Carries Penalty of \$500 for First Offense.

(Special to The Bulletin.) Hartford, April 1.—After the disposition of the bulk of the business at the Thursday session of the house, Speaker Halsey honored Representative Rogers, of Litchfield, by calling him to the chair to preside for the balance of the day. Mr. Rogers is conceded to be the house leader and it was the evident intention of some of his fellow members to have some report with the temporary chairman. In this way they were disappointed as the successfully parried all darts thrown at him in observance of April Fool's day. When Mr. Devine of Waterbury doubted a vote he was declared out of order, and when Mr. Hart of Wethersfield said that he did not believe the speaker declare the result of a vote he was politely informed that he must have been asleep at the switch. After the clerk's desk had cleared of business on motion of Mr. Hyde, of Manchester, the house adjourned to 11.15 next Tuesday morning.

The act passed in the house concerning certain diseases of domestic animals came back to the house amended. The house reconsidered its former action, concurred with the senate and the bill as amended. The bill gives the commission increased powers in the treatment of the prevalent foot and mouth disease. Staff Matter Recommended. The act concerning the governor's staff, providing for appointment of a portion of the staff from the military service, which was indefinitely postponed by the senate, was ordered re-committed to the committee on military affairs by vote of the house.

No Candee Judge. The judiciary committee reported unfavorably the resolution appointing Nehemiah Candee, judge of the court at Norwich. Mr. Hyde stated the committee was to report favorably on resolution of appointment. The report was accepted and bill rejected. Bill is Recommitted. The vote rejecting the bill concerning the managers and their powers of location for dependent children was reconsidered, and the matter re-committed to the committee on humane institutions.

No Change in Control. The bill which would give to city councils the control of operation of street car lines, was reported unfavorably by the railroad committee. Report rejected. Committee of Conference. There was disagreeing action on the act concerning moving picture machines, which was passed in the house and amended in the senate. The house voted to instruct Mr. Hyde of Manchester and Mr. Huxbridge of Stamford, were appointed to conference committee, on part of the house.

No Care of Babies. The bill introduced by Mr. Bailey of Norwich, to change the age of admission into county homes, so that children under four years of age would be received, was reported unfavorably by the committee on humane institutions. Mr. Morton, of Saybrook, house chairman of the committee, stated that a change in existing conditions would mean an enlargement of the county homes. He said there was strong opposition to the proposition at the hearing. This is the hearing where Attorney William H. Shields of Norwich, stated that the state provides for the insane, the dependent, the crippled, simple-minded and every dependent person, except the child under four years which is the most helpless creature on earth.

Forfeited Rights. Forfeited rights lost by reason of crime were restored to Ganett, Stack and Harry Schastan, of Stamford. No Trolley Waiting Rooms. The railroad committee reported unfavorably bills providing for trolley stations in cities of 50,000 or more and providing stations at all terminals with modern conveniences. Mr. Wilcox of Stonington, reporting for the committee stated that sewage conditions would not permit observance of such a law. The bills were rejected and report accepted.

Age of Retirement. The committee on constitutional amendments reported unfavorably proposition that would retire justices of the peace at the age of 70. The report was accepted and the proposition rejected. Pay for Solons. Under suspension of the rules, resolution was passed and transmitted to the secretary of the state instructing the comptroller to draw order on treasurer to pay the debtors bill of the house, \$15,480, that portion of the debtors bill due April 1, 1915.

No Seaside Sanatorium. The bill providing for a seaside sanatorium for treatment of bone tuberculosis was unfavorably reported by the committee on humane institutions, and report was accepted and bill rejected. The bill carried with it an appropriation of \$100,000. Bill was also rejected to change the age of commitment in Connecticut state reformatory. Also bill concerning the powers of managers of institutions for dependent and neglected children, and another bill was killed that specified that the tuberculosis commission shall establish no sanatorium south of the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad company, between the Thames and Connecticut rivers. Seawall at Greenwich. This act was taken from the calendar and passed. That Maud E. DuPont, her heirs and assigns, are hereby authorized to construct and maintain a seawall or seawalls in front of and around land owned by her in the town of Greenwich on Long Island sound, situated on the westerly side of River avenue and bounded northerly by land of Louis G. Mertz and easterly by River avenue, southerly by land of Aben-droth, and westerly by the Byram river, and to fill in and grade the space within such seawalls as they may deem expedient. The space so filled or to be filled as aforesaid is granted to said Maud E. DuPont, her heirs and assigns forever, provided such filling in and seawalls shall not impede navigation. Pledge of Stock. An act was passed in the house amending an act concerning the pledging of stock of corporations, so as to read: Shares of stock in any corporation organized under the laws of this state, or of the United States, or treasurer's receipts for payment on subscription to the stock of any corporation organized under the laws of this state, may be pledged by delivering the certificate of such stock or such receipt to the pledgee, in a power of attorney for its transfer. National Banks Barred. An act concerning national banking associations acting as trustee, executor, administrator or registrar of stocks and bonds was rejected after a long debate. The text of the bill follows: Section 1. Any national banking association created and doing business in the state, to which shall be granted a special permit by the federal reserve board of the United States, under the provisions of the federal reserve act of the United States, to act as trustee, executor, administrator, or registrar of stocks and bonds, may be appointed in the state to act as trustee, executor, administrator, or registrar of stocks and bonds. Sec. 2. The court of probate having jurisdiction may, in the discretion of said court, require such banking association to give bond for the faithful performance of its duty as trustee, executor, or administrator; provided no such bond shall be required if the instrument appointing such banking association as trustee or executor so specifies. Sec. 3. No national banking association shall act in such capacity until it shall have filed with the bank commissioner and with the secretary of the state, a duly certified copy of the permit granted to such banking association by the federal reserve board of the United States. Sec. 4. A copy of such permit filed with the secretary of the state shall, when attested by said secretary under his hand and the seal of the state, be prima facie evidence of the facts set forth therein. Sec. 5. This act shall take effect from its passage, and shall apply to all wills and codicils which have been or shall hereafter be executed.

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work at any time." Tabled for calendar. Signs on Highways. The committee on roads, bridges and river reported a bill directing the highway commissioner to erect and maintain uniform signs bearing directions for the guidance of travel. Sealers of Weights and Measures. The committee on the judiciary reported a substitute bill providing two sealers of weights and measures to be appointed by the county commissioners, the salary of each sealer to be not more than \$1,800 a year in addition to expenses to be allowed by the county commissioners. Billiard and Pool Rooms. The committee on the judiciary reported a bill giving the first specimen of a town, or the chief of police, power to close billiard and pool rooms at 12 o'clock, midnight. Baseball Pools. The following substitute bill concerning baseball pools introduced by Senator Klett was passed: "Every person, whether as principal, agent, or servant, who shall directly or indirectly or by means of any device, scheme or system make a pool, wager or bet with money, checks or other valuable thing or with tokens or symbols of any kind upon a football or baseball game or upon anything relating to or connected therewith, whether said games are played within or without the state, shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars for the first offense and not more than one thousand dollars, or imprisoned, not more than one year in jail, or both for any subsequent offense. Each day of making such pool, wager or bet shall be considered a separate offense." State Library Committee. On the motion of Senator Everts the resolution appointing Charles D. Burch and William Blamers mem-

bers of the state library commission was referred to the committee on state library. Hartford School Districts. Senator Mulvey reported the favorable report of the committee on cities and boroughs on the bill annexing a part of the territory of the Southwick school district in Hartford to the Hartford South School district and the bill was passed.
