Connecticut Agricultural College Bulletin Points Out the Need.

The importance of agriculture in the state and the extent to which it can be developed, not fully realized even by the majority of the people of our own state, says the Connecticut Agricultural College Bulletin.

There are hundreds of fruit trees in this state that are not properly pruned, sprayed, fertilized or cultivated, and which as a result produce an inferior product.

Many farms that at one time had large dairy herds now have only a small number of cows or none at all. This is the result of unsatisfactory marketing conditions, cows that were not profitable producers due to a lack of understanding of the principles of breeding and feeding.

Vegetable products are brought into our state by the carload. There are hundreds of acres of excellent land suitable for market gardening, but now lying idle, near every large town and city that wants fresh vegetables.

Other specialized agricultural industries have possibilities of being further developed.
