Special City Meeting.

At a special city meeting held in the town hall Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock the following resolution was presented by Corporation Counsel C. A. Capen and adopted, after which the meeting was adjourned.

Resolved That resolution No. 1001, passed by the common council of the city of Willimantic on the 14th day of June, A. D. 1915, be, and hereby is, ratified and approved in accordance with the provisions thereof, to quit claim unto Robert H. Fenton of said city all the right, title and interest in and to a certain piece or lot of land situated on the northerly side of Summit street, in the city of Willimantic, town and county of Windham, state of Connecticut, bounded and described as follows, to wit:

At the intersection of the northerly line of said Summit street with the easterly line of Church street, about 96 feet to the land of John Tracy, thence northerly by land last mentioned about 40 feet to land of Fenton; thence westerly by land last mentioned about 96 feet to the westerly line of Church street; thence southerly on the easterly line of said Church street about 3 inches to place of beginning; and that his honor the Mayor, Daniel P. Dunn, be, and hereby is, appointed agent, and in behalf of said city of Willimantic to execute all necessary papers to carry this resolution into effect.

Monday morning's session of the police court saw a number of cases, two of which were for violation of the traffic laws, and one of Windham cases of intoxication, as well as one for trespass on railroad property.
