\$500 STORM DAMAGE.

Sudden Tempest Saturday, With Fall of Hail - Lightning Strikes Seymour House. The most violent tempest that has visited this section for several years came at noon Saturday. It lasted 50 minutes, with terrific thunder and lightning and hail. It is not within the memory of the oldest residents to recall such a deluge of rain and hail.

The storm came up quickly. It was directly overhead. It was sharp and short and in 50 minutes 1-1/2 inches of rain fell. Much damage was done. Five hundred dollars is a low estimate for the cost of repairing the streets. Hill street suffered the most. Over 200 rods of gravel were necessitated to repair it. Mexey Seymour's house on Mathewson street was struck. The chimney was demolished and the ridge-boards ripped off. The lightning grounded by the way of the drain pipe went into a side.

The heavy dew here at 1.00 got a dose between here and Plainfield. The fluid came off the wire, went down the trolley pole, set the rear platform on fire and burned out the motor. There being two cars attached, they proceeded after a short delay. At the telephone exchange and in many private residences there was a display of electric pyrotechnics fit to make one nervous. An outbuilding was struck on the corner of Birney and there are four fine pigs under 'Finn Bros.' barn, the cellar is low, with a steep grade to the street. The storm cooled and the cellar has a cement floor saved their bacon. Several trees were struck and the sand was blown in many places ruined some growing crops.
