MONTVILLE PASTOR'S FAREWELL

Rev. George C. Chappell Leaving Baptist Church for Pastor at Bristol, Vermont—Gave Report of His Six Years With Union Baptist Church—46 New Members in That Time.

At the Union Baptist church in Montville Sunday morning Rev. George C. Chappell, who this month leaves that pastorate for new charge at Bristol, Vt., gave a report of the six years of his ministry, from June, 1909, to June, 1915, and made his congregation farewell in the following words:

Members of the Union Baptist Church, Montville, Conn. As I am to close my labors with you as your pastor July 31, it has seemed to me to give you today a brief history of the six years we have been permitted to work together.

Forty-six persons have united with the church by baptism since my coming here and letter. Nearly all of these have come from the faithful members of the church and Christian Endeavor society. Our special evangelistic work we have conducted unselfishly, without the help of an outside evangelist.

Your pastor has supplied the churches of the Montville Baptist church with the following: The Bible school has enjoyed a profitable period under the leadership of efficient officers and teachers. The church has been reorganized and rechartered Nov. 8, 1911. The average attendance has been 80. Fifty children were chosen for Children's day, 1911. The home department numbers 20; the Agona and Baraca classes were organized in 1910 and have held 80 social gatherings and three banquets; 80 men were present at the first Agona banquet and 56 at the second.
