FEDERALS GIVE UP CONTEST OVER COMPTON. Officials Discovered the Fast That He Was Not a Free Agent.

St. Louis, July 28.—The circuit court granted the permanent injunction. The stipulation of counsel filed with the court stated that the fine of \$500 imposed on Compton for jumping to the Federals would be remitted and that his salary of \$3,000 would be paid.

Under the national agreement, Compton has sustained automatic suspension for three years because he played two games with the St. Louis Federals last Saturday. Whether the Kansas City club will ask the national commission to reinstate him was not decided today.

MINORS HOLD THE WHIP HAND Says President Gilmore of Federals, and Need Not "Stand the Gaff"—C. T. Chapin, President of Rochester Club of the International League, Writes Against the Outlaws for Signing Kores, Formerly of the Giants.

Chicago, July 28.—Declaring minor leagues hold the whip hand and need not "stand the gaff" unless they choose President Gilmore of the Federal League today replied to a protest of C. T. Chapin, president of the Rochester club of the International League, against the signing of Arthur E. Kores, whom Rochester bought from the New York Nationals for \$2,500.

"It is not possible for such a player to receive endorsement by the Federal League, we cannot understand, any more than we can understand how you plan to bring about recognition for your league by organized baseball in the face of such questionable methods."

HUGH M'KINNON ATTACHES BOX OFFICE RECEIPTS Former Hartford Colonial League Manager Wants Back Salary. The trouble between Hugh A. McKinnon, who has resigned as business manager of the Hartford baseball club, and the Colonial league over salary details regarding the Hartford club, when McKinnon, through his lawyer, had an attachment filed on the receipts of Tuesday's game in Hartford in order to protect what he claims is due him through non-payment of salary by the Colonial league's officials.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL STOCK MARKET ACTIVE. Total Sales Were 1,130,000 Shares—Gains of Industrials Were Well Maintained.

New York, July 28.—Speculation was on a large scale today, the volume of business passing the market being the spectacular advance among the industrials continued but the movement as a whole was less impressive than yesterday. The bullish character of the United States Steel's quarterly statement resulted in keen bidding for that stock, which changed hands in lots of several thousand shares, rose to 87, the highest of the year. The largest advances however, were in Crucible Steel and Bethlehem Steel, which closed with new records.

The electrical stocks were unusually active. The rise in Westinghouse was influenced by the company's receipt of a large new contract for the construction of a large power plant, which was being understood to call for 800,000 rifles with an option on the construction of 200,000 more.
