MOVE FOR BETTER SIDEWALKS Mayor Brings Subject Up Again Before Common Council— is Authorized to Call City Meeting to Take Action on Issue of Sidewalks Bonds—Street Commissioner Given Authority to Direct Owners to Make Suitable Repairs.

A renewed expression by Mayor T. C. Murphy of his desire to have a general improvement of sidewalks in the city was a prominent feature in the August meeting of the common council, which was held on Monday evening. The council members responded by voting to give the mayor authority to call a city meeting to vote on the issue of sidewalk bonds.

At 8:15 o'clock Mayor Murphy called the meeting to order. The roll call by clerk, Charles A. Brown, called Councilmen Hugh Kinder, T. B. Babcock, W. P. Bailey and W. F. Lester as the absentees.

More Highlights. For the police commissioners Alderman Henry Gebraht reported favorable reports on the Oak Ridge street and two lights on Maple court. The report was accepted and the resolutions adopted.

Petition from George E. Fellows & Co. for a sidewalk grade on the easterly side of Lake street was referred to the public works committee. Rescinded Former Vets. Clerk Crowell read a preamble and resolution referring to a vote in the common council on April 21 regarding the building of gutters in Page street before the street could be accepted.

Special Constable. Mayor Murphy announced the appointment of John Loozy, Jr., as a special constable and the appointment was ratified by vote of the council. All eight ballots were for Mr. Loozy.

For Sidewalk Improvement. Saying that he thought the council ought to give an opinion upon the subject which he was about to introduce Mayor Murphy made the following statement upon the subject of improved sidewalks: To the members of the Court of Common Council.

When I assumed office, three years ago, when I assumed office, one of the many things I wished to see done by the city was to improve the sidewalks of the city. An attempt was made by the court of common council some time ago to insist on property owners repairing sidewalks, but it was not successful.

There is no doubt that objection will be raised by some of our citizens, but they will bring to our attention the thousands of dollars spent in repairing highways and widening streets that have met with their approval. It would seem to me this bond issue ought to be unanimously approved, for there are miles of sidewalks in this city that are almost impassable.
