NO REASON FOR LENIENCY.

Although no decision has been announced from Washington, reports indicate that there has been a change in the view taken of the Dunsley case.

THE SUBMARINE REPORT.

In view of the reported loss of the submarine which sank the Arabic and the sinking of Germany in that belief, the return to its base must have been as much of a surprise to the German admiralty as it was to the rest of the world.

In justifying his action in torpedoing the Arabic the German submarine commander sets up the claim of self defense, and declares that it was his belief that while engaged in sinking the freighter Dunsley the Arabic had discovered the undersea boat and altered its course so as to run down the submarine.

STATE OF CONNECTICUT. Treasury Department. TAXES ON INVESTMENTS.

Owners of securities such as notes, bonds and other shares in action including deposits in bank, (not a Savings Bank) are liable to taxation either to the State or locally.

The State rate is four mills on the dollar and MUST BE paid BEFORE OCTOBER 1st. Enquire of your banker or write to State Treasurer, Hartford, Conn.

A HEAVY PENALTY is fixed for avoiding this tax by a law passed by the last General Assembly. A copy of the law will be mailed to any one writing for it.
