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ENLARGEMENT OF GROTON PLAN

Under Consideration by Electric Boat Company—To Increase Facilities for Making Diesel Engines, Says Wall Street Journal—Chinese Learning Submarine Boat Construction at Groton.

The extent to which the business of building submarines has grown since the outbreak of the great European war is shown in a story published in the Wall Street Journal. This reliable financial publication says that Electric Boat Co. stock is being bought by the stockholders, who have great faith in the future of the submarine.

The story contains interesting allusions to the plan of the New London Ship & Engine Co. in Groton, especially in reference to the submarines for the Chinese government and to the submarines which the United States government may build. This is the story in part: Thirty Chinese are at the Electric Boat Co.'s Groton plant learning the intricacies of submarine boat construction and operation. It is believed that financial arrangements for the purchase of these boats will soon be completed by the Chinese commissioner, Charles M. Schwab has agreed to take part notes in payment for his share of the order. New York bankers say China can easily raise a loan of between \$40,000,000 and \$60,000,000 in this country, but that it is doubtful if China could raise \$100,000,000. It is not impossible that the Standard Oil Co. will figure largely in the credit extended to the Chinese government.
