William J. Geary Expires After Stepping From Wagon—Builders Figuring On Contract for New Banking House.

It now develops that Contractor Dotole deposited no check and, in fact, have declined the contract if offered to him for the price specified in his bid, having subsequent to filing his bid, realized that a mistake had been made and the work could not be done without loss at the price he submitted.

Had the selectmen made a statement along these lines in response to their critics, the result of the action of the town meeting would be of a reverse nature.

William J. Geary, who was engaged in the fish business, sailing from a wagon, died very suddenly Wednesday evening. He was in apparent good health when he drove to a market in Main street, where he obtained his supply of fish, but he had been slightly ill from his wagon when he dropped dead. Dr. M. H. Scanlon, medical examiner, viewed the body and permitted its removal to the Murphy morgue and it was subsequently taken to the late home of the deceased in Tower street. Mr. Geary was a blacksmith, by trade, working at that occupation in the local quarries for 25 years. An account of a fall in the granite business, coupled with the physical ailment, a lameness caused by an injury while at his work, he engaged in the fish business several years ago, making regular visits to the plant and other points outside the village of Westerly. He leaves a widow and one son, a brother, Dennis Geary, and a sister, Mrs. Patrick Hogan.

Builders are figuring for the contract to construct the new banking house for the Industrial Trust company, which is to replace the present bank building on High street and to be erected on that site. The bidders are required to give figures both for Westerly and for granite and Georgia marble for the front of the building. It is said that the sum appropriated for the building, which is to be devoted wholly to banking business, is \$75,000 and the building is to be completed by October 1, 1916.

The successful bidder becomes the owner of the present building and its furnishings, except the vault, counters and furniture proper, and the removal of the building becomes a part of the contract. It is planned to have the bids opened next Saturday at the main banking house of the Industrial Trust company in Providence. The new structure will cover all the land of the company in High street, which means a doubling of the floor space.
