Federal Game Law to Be Observed. County Game Warden Arthur Day announced Thursday that he has received instructions from the federal game commissioner for Connecticut to see that the federal law, rather than the state law, is observed as to the opening of the season for shooting woodcock. The federal law provides

that woodcock are not to be shot prior to Oct. 10. The state law specifies Oct. 15 as the date on which the shooting of them may legally commence. Therefore local hunters must wait until Oct. 10 before shooting any woodcock, and they will be in danger of arrest and prosecution.

The open season for shooting ducks and geese opens next Friday, Oct. 1. The delay of hunting woodcock by following the federal law is only two days, but it is very important that it be observed, for Uncle Sam is apt to be a little more severe with parties caught violating any of the provisions he has laid down for the protection of game birds.

Regular Street Sweeper Needed. It is already apparent that the new paving in Main street must receive constant attention in order that it may be kept as clean as it should be, and appointed street sweeper places where job, as is done in all places where such paving is in use.

How the expense of sweeping can be met is a subject for discussion and suggestion at the present time. One man is prompt in presenting his idea that as the new paving is on a trunk line, so the need of a sweeper is more pressing here than would ordinarily be the case.
