

All Trolleys Lead To The Business Center of Norwich



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REAL SENTENCE OF ONE YEAR

For Aleck Lacosky of Montville—Bigamist Also Sent to Jail For a Year—Witness in Ledyard Case in Contempt of Court for Talking to a Juror About Prisoner Whose Trial is Expected to Begin Tuesday.

Not until they had had the case under discussion for most of the afternoon did the jury in the criminal superior court on Friday return a verdict of guilty against Aleck Lacosky of Montville, who was accused of making an innocent man pay five years in prison for a crime he had committed on July 10th last.

Major Hill spoke against leniency for the prisoner and said both women had been delinquent wrongdoers. The first wife said that the first she knew of his second marriage was when she had him arrested in New London for non-support. His arrest for bigamy followed and he has been in jail since June 28th.

After receiving the case at 1.31 p. m. following the charge by Judge William H. Williams the jury had the case until 3.45, when they returned the verdict mentioned. State Attorney Hill called attention to the length of time that it had taken the jury to agree upon a verdict, and said that probably indicated something, and as there had been no actual physical injury done the child, he hoped the court could consistently refrain from sending the man to state's prison, which was a possibility under the offense charged.

Day, who is lame, said he has been a chauffeur when called to the stand by Attorney Hollander. He testified that he had provided for his wife as well as he could, but their married life had not been happy. He did not think that he had ever claimed before his wife and in the presence of other witnesses that he was divorced from his wife, as she said he had.

State Attorney Hill spoke of Lacosky's connection with a chicken stealing case in which Lacosky had turned state's evidence so that at that time a note had been entered against him and said that the indictment charging it would have been hard to convict without Lacosky's evidence.

Major Hill said that the first she knew of his second marriage was when she had him arrested in New London for non-support. His arrest for bigamy followed and he has been in jail since June 28th. Mrs. Day said her husband had talked to her about divorce but she had always refused to do so.

Bigamist Sent to Jail. In the afternoon session of court, while the jury in the Lacosky case was out, State Attorney Hill called up the case of the state against John F. Day of New London and was married to Day in Westerly about a year ago.

While the jury was out in the Lacosky case, Charles Yerrington was presented before the court on a bench warrant charging him with contempt of court in having said to one of the jurors, Henry C. Harris of Salem: "If you are on the jury in the Coon case, he is a bad fellow."
