The Legal Voters in Town Meeting in the Town of Norwich are hereby warned to meet in Annual Town Meeting in their several Voting Districts as by law provided, to wit:

Also to determine whether the Town will make an appropriation to assist in maintaining the Otis Library.
Also to act upon the petition of more than twenty legal voters of the Town, asking that the Town appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$15,000 to relieve pupils residing in the Town of Norwich and who attend the Norwich Free Academy of the customary term fees for the school year of 1915-1916.

WANTS SUPPORT FROM HIS BARRISTERS
Mrs. Dora Sternlieb Brings Suit in Superior Court—Thames Loan and Trust Receiver Moves to Collect Notes—Bondsman Sues Man for Whom He Went Surety—Claims Real Estate Transfer Made for Purposes of Fraud.

Among new suits returnable before the superior court in October filed on Tuesday at the office of Clerk George E. Parsons is that of Dora B. Sternlieb against her husband, Louis Sternlieb, of Norwich, in which she alleges that her husband is able to provide support for her, but has neglected to do so, and she is poor and unable to support herself. Real estate known as No. 32 and 34 High street has been attached. H. E. Pettis is attorney for the plaintiff.

Several months ago Mrs. Sternlieb brought a divorce suit against her husband, which is still pending. For Foreclosure of Mortgage. George H. WITH THE AETNA-IZERS TO PACIFIC COAST.

F. L. Lathrop One of the Fortunate Prize Winning Delegates. F. L. Lathrop of J. L. Lathrop & Son, agents for the Aetna Accident and Liability company of Hartford, Conn., will be one of nearly a thousand "Aetna-izers" to attend the company's convention at San Francisco October 6th to 10th. The delegates to this convention have been selected solely on a basis of merit, as demonstrated by a seven month selling campaign in the various and miscellaneous insurance lines and fidelity and surety bond business, only new business being fully paid for. To give all a fair chance, the agents were divided into four groups, according to the population of their territory, and a carefully graded scale of credits was arranged for the twenty-seven lines of insurance included in the convention campaign.

The number of delegates is the largest ever brought together for a convention of this kind, a fact ever more noteworthy when it is remembered that this big life insurance department of the company does not take part. The convention marks the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Aetna Life Insurance company's entrance into the accident insurance field, as well as the completion this year of the company's \$75 million-dollar, home office building.

The holding of this convention comes at a convenient time and place also to celebrate the award of the "Grand Prize" for the company's exhibit in the accident prevention field at the Panama-California exhibition in San Diego. Both of these big exhibitions will be visited by the delegates in a body on the convention trip, and in each place one of the delegates has been officially designated "Aetna Day" by the exposition officials.

Several special trains, running over the trunk lines, will be made at convenient points by the delegates from all the eastern states, until Colorado Springs is reached. Here delegates from the South will depart. West will meet the men from the east and all will have an opportunity for sight-seeing, including a visit to the Garden of the Gods at Manitou. From here the delegates will travel in special trains to San Francisco by way of the famous Royal Gorge of the Arkansas river, and passing through the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. At West will meet the men from the east and all will have an opportunity for sight-seeing, including a visit to the Garden of the Gods at Manitou.

The delegates will remain in San Francisco from early Tuesday morning, Oct. 25th, until the following Saturday afternoon, thus having plenty of time for sight-seeing in addition to the convention programme, which will occupy most of Wednesday and Thursday. On Thursday, Oct. 7th, "Aetna Day," the delegates, after marching to the exposition grounds will be met by the exposition officials and military band, who will escort them to the Court of Honor. Here a commemorative bronze medal will be formally presented to W. Lathrop, commissioner of the World's Fair, and Congress (which meets in San Francisco from Oct. 5th to 10th), and a speech of acceptance will be made by President Morgan G. Bulkeley of the Aetna Life. Even more memorable will be the convention banquet that same night at the El Comodoro Hotel, one of the largest banquets ever held in San Francisco.

Sunday, October 10th, the delegates will spend at Los Angeles, and the following day will be "Aetna Day" at the San Diego exposition. After leaving San Diego, the Aetna-izers will make a stop at Riverside, Calif., allowing time for a breakfast at the celebrated Gelwood River inn. A full day will be spent at the Grand Canyon of the Colorado river, and the last feature stop of the eastward trip will be a stop at the Fred Harvey Mesquite of Indian Relics at Albuquerque, New Mexico. Mr. and Mrs. Lathrop leave today to join the trip of the Aetna-izers.
