ROCKEFELLER'S INDUSTRIAL PLAN. As a climax to his visit to Colorado John D. Rockefeller, Jr. has made an interesting proposition to the miners in that region who are employed by his company. He has seen their condition, looked into the manner in which they live and work, and with the result in mind that local industry has put forward a plan for industrial democracy wherein there will be cooperation between himself and the miners for the improvement of conditions and the ending of such troubles as have been experienced in the past.

TIME TO OVERCOME THE WRONG. The question of protecting trade after the war and to prevent this from becoming the dumping ground of cheap goods from Europe is one which deserves much thought. The suggestion is made to Secretary Redfield of the department of commerce by George W. Perkins, chairman of the executive committee of the progressive party that it be met by the creation of a non-partisan tariff board which would regulate the tariff according to the needs of the different branches of industry.
