

Greenville Academy Play Scoreless

Game Bitterly Fought From Start to Finish—Both Teams Lost Chances to Score—Bill Stanley Booted Ball for 60 Yards—Newly Erected Seats Were in Use Saturday

The Greenville Athletic club proved to be a more lively bunch of scrappers on the gridiron than the Academy anticipated and the consequences were that neither team crossed the chalk line for a score on the Academy field Saturday afternoon before the largest crowd of the season.

The game from the first kickoff to the clearing of the dust in the final period was a regular Briton against Briton, with both teams making costly slip-ups that would have exhorted themselves and probably the most conspicuous feature of the game was when Farrell, playing right end for Greenville, muffed a perfect forward pass with an absolute clean field ahead of him and only 30 yards between him and the schoolboys' crossbar.

Forward passes could not be handled by the Academy as twice Bill Stanley threw perfect passes to Captain O'Hearn, who fumbled, although N. F. A. secured a nifty one from Stanley to the end.

The Greenville aggregation was far superior to the Academy on interference, but the Academy showed excellent driving power and push to score. While on the other hand Greenville's defense was far from par, as high catches and balling which caused much comment from the sidelines and led to unnecessary roughness which killed all chances for neat and clean cut football.

The second quarter N. F. A. very nearly scored when Joe Hull's drop kick was carried by the wind, preventing a score. Bill Stanley, punting for the Academy, clearly outpointed Farrell in the booting line, and Bill kicked one for yards.

The Greenville boys have certainly got a fine array of material and with good coaching ought to be able to wipe up any team in their caliber in the state. They appeared in their new uniforms had made an attractive appearance and Saturday was their first real workout of the season they will unquestionably develop into a fast eleven.

The new seats erected on the Academy field were used for the first time and proved to be a great comfort to the spectators, making a marked improvement.

Coach Cavanaugh has plenty of work ahead in polishing up his oval handers for the big games with Bulkeley. To develop and weld together a strong combination there must be a scrupulous team of good strength to help out. As it stands at present at the Academy the scrubs are of an uncertain quantity and quality. If the red and white want to predominate over the orange and black of the London team they must pay more attention to a second team for the first to practice on.

The plays by quarters:

First Quarter. Academy won the coin and chose the north goal with the wind at their backs. Farrell kicked to Holmes, who

ran back 5 yards. W. Stanley made 2 yards around end and Holmes made it first down on an off tackle plunge. W. Stanley again made 5 yards around end and Holmes muffed his way through for 4 more, after which first down was made. Holmes lost 2 yards and a forward pass W. Stanley punted. B. Supa hit the line for 4 yards. Fleming made no gain, but Gadie made a first down. On the next play he was tackled by Holmes and on a blocked punt Greenville recovered, making first down. On four rushes Greenville could not gain 4 yards and on the next down W. Stanley and Holmes made 4 yards and time was called.

Second Quarter. Academy's successful forward pass, W. Stanley to L. Stanley for 20 yards, was worked as the quarter began. The Academy backs failed to block the punt and the Academy went wide. Greenville made three first downs in succession. B. Supa making 5 yards around end, followed by Gadie's 5 yards around end, and a tackle for 20 yards and W. Supa made 10 around right end. Fleming made 10 yards around end and then, but on the next two plays they lost 4 yards and two forward passes were tried, both of which failed. W. Stanley made 10 yards around end and then, but on the next play he was tackled by Holmes and Hull added 5 more. Time was called with the ball in the Academy's possession in the middle.

Third Quarter. Mullins took L. Stanley's place at end and played a fair game. Hull kicked to Fleming, who ran 10 yards. B. Supa made no gain. Gadie and Fleming hit the line but could not move it, and Farrell kicked to Holmes. N. F. A. fumbled, but Wilcox recovered. Holmes could not gain. W. Stanley made 20 yards around end and then, but on the next play he was tackled by Holmes and Hull added 5 more. Time was called with the ball in the Academy's possession in the middle.

Fourth Quarter. By Hull making 5 yards a fake kick, Stanley punted 60 yards to W. Supa, who ran it back 15 yards. Fleming made 2 yards and on two tries B. Supa could only make 2 yards, and a forward pass W. Stanley punted 4 yards. W. Stanley had the wind behind him and was booming off long punts. He punted 40 yards to the end and on the side Greenville could not gain and Farrell punted to Hull. Holmes made 4 yards through tackle but on the next play the ball was fumbled by Gadie covering. Again Greenville could not gain and was forced to kick. A forward pass, Stanley to O'Hearn, was fumbled by O'Hearn, but was recovered. Sullivan was injured and left the game. W. Stanley kicked 40 yards to Supa, who was tackled in his tracks. Gadie could not gain and Fleming lost a yard. Here came Greenville's only chance to score, when with an open field before him Farrell kicked to the end and the quarter ended after Hull had intercepted another try at forward.

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FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

SATURDAY'S MARKET.

The Two Hour Session Was Unusually Active.

New York, Oct. 23.—Trading was active during the two hour session of the stock market, in which several new high records were made, mainly in automobile shares and Baldwin Locomotive. The latter rose 1/2 to 154 1/2 in the first hour, but dropped 7 points later on unofficial demand that the company was to figure in merger with the Midvale Steel company.

Studebaker and Continental (an all-day) manifested reactionary tendencies, the former losing 7 points at 183 1/2, while Can yielded over 5 to 105 on the statement that it had failed to close a large war contract long under negotiation. General Electric, Westinghouse and Pullman Car were among the other heavy specialties, while National Enamelling and Stamping was in sudden demand at an advance of 4 points to 73 7/8.

United States Steel held around yesterday's closing price, but denoted some pressure in the final dealings, when the entire list developed heaviness in connection with the weakness in foreign exchange. Total volume amounted to \$30,000 shares. Studebaker, United States Steel and Baldwin Locomotive contributing a large part of the whole.

London's stock exchange was closed, but further offerings of our securities were reported from there, tentatively as a direct outcome of the break in exchange. Pacifics and some of the strangers were included in the foreign selling, which exercised little appreciable effect. In fact, Canadian Pacific and a few others subject to foreign liquidation closed at net gains.

Among the few items which were submitted was the September statement of Southern Pacific, with a net gain of \$25,000. The company reported a wider distribution of merchandise and increased retail demand. In place of the large cash gain which was reported from the shifting of money the bank statement showed no appreciable change in this item, but actual loans expanded by over \$4,000,000, and deposits by \$42,000,000, with an increase of \$4,528,000 in excess reserves.

The bond market was firm on tight dealings. Total sales (par value) aggregated \$2,370,000. United States bonds were higher by 1/4 to 1/2 per cent. on call for the week.
