FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL MARKET NERVOUS, UNSETTLED. Result of Unfavorable Foreign Developments Over the Holiday.

New York, Nov. 3.—Unfavorable foreign developments over the holiday were mainly responsible for today's nervous and unsettled market. The Frank utterances of the British premier, including a virtual admission of the failure of the allies in the Dardanelles and the continued success of the Teutonic forces in the Balkans, caused additional uneasiness in London. The feeling of pessimism was heightened by Britain's further seizure of 200,000 tons of American hardware.

Efforts to associate today's heavy trend with yesterday's elections were not seriously taken. All the issues connected with those returns were regarded by Wall Street as having little if any rational or bearing upon national affairs. War shares exercised a depressing influence from the outset. Bethlehem Steel opened at 47 1/2, and closed at 46 1/2, but fell violently to 42 1/2 and closed at 43. General Motors scored a sharp advance, rising from 100 to 105 1/2, but fell to 102 1/2, despite the publication of the company's annual report.

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HARVARD OUGHT TO DEFEAT PRINCETON ACADEMY-BULKELEY FOOTBALL RECORDS

Captain Eddie Mahan may beat the Tiger eleven at Princeton Saturday. The assistance of his teammates should be capable of giving him a victory over the Princeton Tiger Saturday. It would be utterly foolish to claim that the Tiger eleven is the best in the class with the Harvard array of 1914. The graduation of such men as Harvard, Pennek, Bradley, Evans, Turnbull, and Coolidge constituted a loss that even Harvard, with its immense student body and long-established football system, could not expect to altogether offset.

It would be equally foolish to claim that the Tiger eleven, despite its record, is better than the Princeton eleven of last year, for the Tiger eleven were dealt a somewhat better break than the Princeton eleven. The Princeton eleven, while scholastic difficulties lost to the Tiger team such a promising lineman as Bigler. Harvard, with its immense student body and long established football system, should produce, even under such adverse conditions, a team which would be a credit to the college.

Washington, Nov. 3.—The British embassy, at the instance of the state department, began today an inquiry into the situation with respect to the British foreign office's prohibition of tobacco exports to neutral countries. Southern representatives in congress have told Secretary Lansing that difficulties imposed by Great Britain upon tobacco exports to neutral countries have been virtually prohibited.
