STATE'S CROP YIELD UNUSUALLY LARGE

Report for Connecticut is 101.7 of Last Year's Average.

Connecticut crops are unusually large this year in yield, according to the department of agriculture experts. They say that the average of yields this year of all Connecticut crops reported upon, combined and duly weighed, is 101.7 per cent. of the average yield last year.

The production of corn in Connecticut is estimated at 3,022,000 bushels, the rate of yield being 89 per cent. per acre, and the quality 90 per cent. There were still 74,000 bushels of corn from last year's crop on Connecticut farms at the beginning of this month.

The production of potatoes in the state is 2,322,000 bushels at 23 bushels per acre, the crop being 89 per cent. quality. Of apples, the yield is 511,000 bushels of 77 per cent. quality; pears, 36,000 bushels of 86 per cent. quality. The grape crop is 78 per cent. a full crop and is 83 per cent. quality.

WROTE THREATENING LETTERS TO SCHOOL TEACHER

W. A. Bromley, 18, of North Stonington, Arrested on This Charge.

Jackson, of North Stonington, on the charge of writing threatening letters to Miss Ada Lewis, a 17-year-old school teacher at North Stonington. Probable cause was found and he was held for the high court under bonds of \$2,500. The boy was taken to the county jail at New London by State Policeman Jackson. It is said the boy has been in trouble before, having been concerned in a theft case in Rhode Island.

INVOLUNTARY BANKRUPTCY.

Petition Brought Against the C. C. Church Co. of New London.

On a petition brought by three creditors the C. C. Church Co. of New London was adjudged bankrupt on Nov. 22nd and the case has come before Bankruptcy Referee Thomas M. Shields.

The involuntary bankruptcy has been brought about on the petition of Brown Durrell Co., Charles E. Adams Co. and Clapp & Tilton, all of Boston, who allege that there was a partnership with C. C. Church Co., which Griffin as partners, which owes more than \$1,000 in debts and that they are creditors in excess of \$300 over any securities they may hold. They allege that acts of insolvency have been committed in permitting two creditors to obtain preference through legal proceedings and the transfer by assignment of a portion of the property to one creditor with intent to prefer him.

The case presents some unusual conditions, it is understood, as over a year ago by an agreement of the creditors an agent was appointed to realize on the assets and that a considerable portion of the assets was converted into cash. When some of the creditors, however, wanted payments made to them, the agent said that he could not legally decide who the creditors were that were entitled to share in the money that had been realized, but that he was perfectly willing to turn over to any properly constituted authority the considerable sum that had been realized. The involuntary bankruptcy has followed this.

ABANDONMENT OF PRESENT TYPE OF SUBMARINE.

Lesson Learned During Recent Manoeuvres of Atlantic Fleet.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Abandonment of the present coast defense type submarine in favor of larger sea-going submarines may be recommended by the navy department as a result of lessons learned during the recent manoeuvres of the Atlantic fleet and unofficial information concerning the size of the under-water craft now in service in Europe. There are indications, it was said today that the United States is lagging behind in submarine development even with one 1,000 ton submarine nearing completion and two 1,300 tons soon to be ordered. Navy officials have been particularly impressed by the apparent probability that a submarine of approximately 1,500 tons and measuring 250 feet in length has been engaged

In the warfare against allied merchantmen. Reports on the fleet manoeuvres, it has just become known, tell graphic stories of the difficulties encountered by the twelve little submarines attached to the "Blue" force commanded by Admiral Fletcher and defending the coast against a theoretical enemy. The boats were at sea several days and encountered continuous rough weather. While no unexpected mechanical troubles were encountered, the personnel of the vessels suffered extremely from seasickness, bad air, improper food and the continual buffeting they received in the pitching and rolling. To impairment of the efficiency of the crew by seasickness alone many minor mishaps to the boats are said to be attributed.
