## JEWETT CITY

Democratic Caucus—Borough Meeting Recommends Year's Appropriations—Shooter Escapes From Town. The democratic caucus to nominate borough officials was held Tuesday evening in the town hall. The chairman was William G. Murray; clerk, Jacob Wechsler. The ticket nominated follows: Police warden, J. H. McCarthy; burgess, Louis Masse; clerk and treasurer, William F. Crumb; assessor, enforcer, William G. Murray; street sweeper, Jacob Wechsler; borough committee, Daniel F. Finn, Edwin M. Gray, Arthur L. Heuroux.

Appropriations Recommended. The regular monthly meeting was held Monday evening, Warden A. M. Brown, presiding. The chief of police was administered to by M. H. Suloway, Moses Loranger and James P. Walsh.

It was voted that F. H. Gilbert be paid \$1,518.14 and Chandler and Palmer \$92.95 in connection with sewer work. The following estimates were made for the maintenance of departments for the ensuing year: Streets \$1,000, garbage \$350, police \$650, the water department \$1,000, printing \$80, fire department \$850, election expenses \$80, miscellaneous \$375, insurance \$60, clerk and treasurer \$25, electric light plant \$450, park \$100.

It was voted to recommend a tax of 5 mills to meet the running expense of the water plant to apply on existing indebtedness. Bills voted paid included: F. H. Gilbert, labor and teams and gravel, \$12; Charles W. Robinson, \$12; C. Co., \$202; Martin Wolf, police, \$53.14; house phone, \$4.65; Edward Rousseau, \$19.95; J. C. Electric Light Co., \$12; J. H. Gilbert, \$12; Crumb, \$76.37; G. W. Robinson \$2.

## SECTIONAL MEETINGS OF PAN-AMERICAN CONGRESS

Scores of Papers Read, Most of Them on Technical Subjects. Washington, Jan. 4.—Members of the Pan-American Scientific congress began an additional 10 sectional meetings, no joint session being held. Scores of papers, most of them on technical subjects, were read.

Jeremiah W. Jenks, of New York, financial expert, took the floor on the balance of trade in the commerce between South America and the United States, advocated the maintenance of exchange facilities so that profits from the exchange process itself would come to the United States rather than go through European countries. He said the balance of trade in the commerce between South America and the United States on the whole was favorable to the United States.

Delegates to the congress tonight were the guests of the Carnegie institution at a reception.

## HEARINGS ON ADMINISTRATION'S NATIONAL DEFENSE PROGRAM

Washington, Jan. 4.—Hearings on the administration's national defense program will begin tomorrow when the house naval committee takes up the annual navy appropriation bill. The first subject for consideration will be requirements of government yards and docks, concerning which Rear Admiral Stanford, chief of the bureau of yards and docks, will be examined. Members of the committee think it will be several weeks before the construction program is reached.

## RESUMPTION OF MINING ACTIVITIES IN MEXICO.

Washington, Jan. 4.—Resumption of mining activities in Mexico on a broad scale is indicated in despatches today to the state department. The American Smelting and Refining Company, Mexico has purchased ten engines and 165 railroad cars with necessary equipment to provide its own trains, and is preparing to operate its plants as near to their full capacity as conditions permit. Department officials believe this will serve to facilitate the resumption of mining activities generally, thus assisting materially in the restoration of normal conditions.

## FEDERAL RESERVE AGENT ELECTED GOVERNOR OF BANK.

J. Z. Miller, Jr., of Kansas City—No Explanation Made. Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 4.—J. Z. Miller, Jr., federal reserve agent, and chairman of the board of directors of the federal reserve bank here, resigned today and immediately was elected governor of the bank at a meeting of the district directors. Charles M. Sawyer, who was governor, will succeed Mr. Miller as federal reserve agent here, it was said. The appointment is made by the governing board of seven in Washington. No explanation was made of the change.

## FALLING OFF IN SWISS EMBROIDERY IMPORT

Berne, via Paris, Jan. 4, 1.05 p. m.—The Swiss embroidery export to the United States in 1915 amounted to 27,400,000 francs or about 2,000,000 less than in 1914. The record year for the export of embroidery to the United States was 1907, when the value of export amounted to 92,900,000 francs. Since there has been a steady diminution. Especially notable was the decrease in machine-made embroidery owing to the establishment of factories in America.

## BRITISH INTERFERENCE WITH AMERICAN TRADE

Measure Introduced in House Would Authorize Retaliation. Washington, Jan. 4.—Representative Steenerson, republican, of Minnesota, introduced a resolution today aimed at British interference with American trade with European neutrals. It proposes to empower the president to prohibit exports of war-munitions to any belligerent controlling the seas and preventing exports of food or food products from the United States.
