COMPENSATION CLAIMS DISMISSED

In New London Case Where Permanent Disability Was Claimed—Imagination Has Magnified Injuries—Manuel Cabel Was in Employ of Brown Cotton Gin Co.—Was Caught in Shafting—Saved Himself by Bracing With Arms.

Compensation Commissioner James J. Donohue has just rendered his finding and decision in the case of Manuel Cabel of New London, an employe of the Brown Cotton Gin Co. of that city, who brought a claim for further compensation, alleging that there was permanent injury.

While in the employ of the Brown Cotton Gin company at their plant in New London, on the 14th day of May, 1915, claimant sustained a serious injury arising out of and in the course of his employment, said injury not being caused by any willful or serious misconduct on his part.

On June 11th, 1915, a voluntary agreement was entered into by employed and employe, which was in all respects in compliance with the requirements of the act, and said agreement was approved by the commissioner for the second Congressional district.

External Injuries. According to the testimony of the attending physician, Dr. W. L. Douglas, at the scene of the accident there he found Cabel sitting down, that his injuries were mostly bruises, that he had a circular contusion on his upper arm and some other lower down, that the left side of his chest was bruised, and there was a cut or bruise on his head which he thought important.

Became Hypochondriacal. From the testimony of Dr. Douglas it would appear that Cabel has become hypochondriacal; in other words, by thinking almost continually about the injury which he received (even though it was not of a serious nature), and allowing himself to dwell upon it, the injury has become magnified by his imagination.
