JUDGMENTS IN COMMON PLEAS
Foreclosure Entered on Property on the West Side—Defendant is Supposed to be in Italy—Judge Waller Gives Judgment in One Other Norwich Case and One New London Case.
The common pleas court held a motion list session here on Monday afternoon, with Judge C. E. Waller presiding. The motion was entered on the motion list for a number of them went off for reassignment and quite a number were postponed because of the defendant's absence. RECRUITING TO STOP
IN NATIONAL GUARD
If Companies Are Up to the Maximum—Others to Build Up.
Company commanders of the Connecticut National Guard are prohibited by general orders, recently issued, to recruit any more soldiers if the strength of their company is in excess of the minimum strength authorized, which is 65 enlisted men and three officers. When the strength of their companies is reduced by the loss of men, they are permitted to recruit up to that number.
This action on the part of the adjutant general's office has been expected for some time. The renewed interest in military affairs, the formation of five new batteries of field artillery, as well as many other organizations attached to the two infantry regiments has brought the strength of the guard up to the minimum of 3,500 exclusive of the national guard, authorized by the state laws. In anticipation of the order many of the companies have recruited well into the seventies in the hope that when recruiting was prohibited they might be allowed to keep their maximum strength, replacing each discharge by an enlistment. The order from the adjutant general's office, however, will prevent this and give the weaker companies an opportunity to recruit up to the minimum strength, holding the stronger organizations down to that number.
The rest of the orders instructs in a very plain manner that company commanders must cut out the "dead wood" from their companies before the federal inspection which will be in a few weeks. The order is as follows:
"The attention of company commanders is invited to the large number of men who have been marked "absent" at previous federal inspections, and in order to make a better showing at the next inspection, which commences in about two weeks, company commanders will carefully scrutinize the rosters of their organizations and discharge those who are absent from their companies. If they are unable to attend to their duties as soldiers, and are unable to be present at inspection, thereby reducing the efficiency and standing of their companies. The efficiency of a company is to be determined by the number of men present for duty. Dead wood cannot be carried and the organization marked inefficient."
Company commanders whose organizations are now above the minimum strength authorized are required by law to make no further enlistments and when the strength of their companies is reduced by discharge, to the minimum, all men in excess of that number will be carried on a waiting list. This will not be construed as meaning that companies now below the minimum will not be recruited to that strength.
Commanding officers will, immediately after the federal inspection, forward to this office a list of discharges, together with the reasons therefor, and for all such absentees who cannot furnish an excuse satisfactory to this office, to be determined by their commanding officers as required by law and will be discharged for the benefit of the organization.
The action by the adjutant general is the most drastic that has been taken for years. Not since the days of the Spanish-American war has the National Guard of the state been so large and it never before has reached the statutory limit. The above order, in its provisions, is in accordance with the provisions of the state laws, which require that the state troops will have 100 per cent. attendance at the federal inspections to take place during the next few months. Men who are not present are to be fined and dropped from the rolls, unless a satisfactory excuse is approved, but by the adjutant general. The only excuse that probably will be accepted will be a certificate of illness from a reputable physician.

REAL "CONNECTICUT SHIP"
IS THE PONTOPOROS.
148 Separate Portions of State Represented in the Cargo.
The steamship Pontoporos, which sailed from New York Monday bearing supplies for the relief of the destitute Belgians is a real "Connecticut Ship."
Her entire cargo of mixed foodstuffs has been contributed by almost every city and town in the state. Members of churches, school children, workers in all branches of industry, wholesale and retail merchants—all have bent their efforts to have the steamer carry a record shipment of life's necessities to the destitute of Belgium and Northern France. One hundred and forty-eight separate portions of the state are represented in the cargo.
One of the novel features of the campaign to raise the money was the exciting contest between the principal firms of the state to lead in the amount collected.
\$3,000,000 Without Shoes and Clothing.
According to Mr. Anson T. McCook, secretary of the Connecticut committee of the Relief commission, more than \$3,000,000 worth of shoes and clothing had been collected in the state since the outbreak of the war. This is caused, he says, by the scarcity of clothing and shoes among 3,000,000 destitute Belgians and Northern France. Mr. McCook paid a compliment to the people of Connecticut for their generosity and spirit of sympathy for Belgium since the work of the Connecticut committee was begun. He said that in his work as head of the committee he had found it evidenced in many ways.
Underclothes From Wheat Sacks.
"The people of Connecticut have responded to our appeal and I know their full sympathies are with the people of Belgium and Northern France. The need for clothing is so great that the women are now using the sacks in which the wheat is delivered as underclothes for their children."
"We are at present," continued Mr. McCook, "making an appeal for clothing and shoes for these 3,000,000 destitute. The women and children have received no new clothing since the outbreak of hostilities. No new material has entered this starved and frozen country. In the name of this great humanitarian work, I appeal to the generous people of this state to help us in our need for money to buy them. For many reasons worn clothing is not permitted to enter the countries."
Dr. McCook further stated that the cargo of the Pontoporos has been fully covered by insurance. If by any accident the ship is lost, neither the people of Belgium nor the Belgians will suffer any loss.

GOES TO EAST
GARDNER STATE COLONY.
Dr. John L. McAuslan Appointed to Medical Staff.
Dr. John L. McAuslan, for nearly a year past an interne at the Norwich State hospital, has been appointed to the position of medical officer in the Gardner State colony to succeed Dr. Chester A. Van Vorst, resigned.
Dr. McAuslan practiced in Berlin for about fifteen years. He is a graduate of Harvard Medical college, class of 1899 and is registered in Massachusetts. He is married and has one daughter.
Dr. McAuslan is experienced in the treatment of the insane and although it is with regret that the hospital authorities in the state have so sense of appreciation that he has secured such a desirable position.

TIME EXTENDED FOR
BLOCK ISLAND FISHERS.
Need Not Move Their Shacks From Reservation Until May 1.
An order of the Department of Commerce has given fishermen on Block Island, who have abandoned their winter house reservation, until May 1 to remove them, according to information received by Congressman O'Shaunessy. This is the second time in five months, a previous order having been issued by the department to remove the fishermen's shacks. At this time the shacks are three or four in number on the Sandy Point reservation, occupied by fishermen.

RECALLS SOME COMMENT
ON CUSTER MASSACRE.
Death of Chief Ogallala Fire Struck
Recollection of Norwich Town Resident.
The death at the age of ninety of Chief Ogallala Fire who fought with Sitting Bull in the Custer massacre as noted in Monday's Bulletin, recalls to the memory of a Norwich Town resident the statement of her sister-in-law, Mrs. L. Phelps Lovell, who at the time was connected with the Sanitar agency in Nebraska, that those at the agency did not blame the Indians for their attack on Custer's forces for the Sioux had sufficient cause in their treatment by the U. S. government for this action.
Writing of the suppression of the outbreak among the Indians in 1890 recently in a Boston paper, Dr. Chas. A. Eastman who married the poet, Miss Goodale, says it was a massacre, not a massacre of white soldiers by savages, but of helpless Indian mothers and babies, and unarmed men, by soldiers of a civilized nation. Dr. Eastman was asked to take charge of the temporary hospital where the wounded were brought, chiefly women and children of all ages from infants in arms, most of the men having been killed outright. Bishop Flare fainted in the hospital when he saw them. This was no Russian or German atrocity, as it was the work of the United States army, and the officer in charge was promoted for doing it, while the newscasters blame the soldiers in spite of the fact that they also killed and wounded many of their own men in the massacre."
