**RELEASE FROM INEBRIATE**  
**FARM WAS ASKED.**  
Twenty-three inmates asked for Pa-  
role—All But Four Were Refused.

The regular quarterly meeting of the  
trustees of the Norwich state hospital  
was held Tuesday at the institution.  
The finance committee held their meet-  
ing at 10 o'clock when routine business  
of the hospital was transacted.

The regular board meeting was  
called to order at 11 o'clock. Chairman  
Costello presiding. The first report  
of Supt. H. M. Pollock, N. Y., was  
read. The report shows that there  
has been a decrease in the number of  
inmates on Oct. 1, and there are a  
number of applications on file.

Twenty-three inmates applied for  
release on parole, and of this number  
all but four were refused. Dr. Richard  
L. Johnson of Farmington and Dr. W.  
Franklin of East Bay Shore, N. Y.,  
were appointed junior assistant physi-  
cians at the hospital after a three  
month trial. Dr. Thomas E. Ryan, N. Y.,  
was appointed acting superintendent,  
and Dr. Edward Everett as acting as-  
sistant superintendent. Both have been  
employed at the institution about three  
years. The board adopted sub-  
stantive resolutions upon the findings of  
the superintendent, Dr. H. M. Pollock,  
who is leaving the institution to take  
charge of a large hospital in Massa-  
chusetts. In the resolution the trust-  
ees make recognition of the great and  
untiring service Dr. Pollock has given  
to the institution during the past year,  
and express the hope that he will  
return and again give the state the  
benefit of his valuable services.
