BELEN SENDS NEWS OF RUSSIAN DEFEAT

Between the Stochod and Styr Rivers--Vienna Announces Capture of Trenches

ARTILLERY ENGAGEMENTS ON ALL THE FRONTS

Heavy Bombardments Have Taken Place in the Champagne Region of France and in the Voges Mountains--Austrians Report the Repulse of Italian Infantry Attacks in the Sagana Valley--Large Numbers of German, Bulgarian and Turks Are Concentrating Along the Greek Frontier--A Rome Despatch Says That Greece and Rumania Have Signed a Dual Neutrality Pact.

There is scarcely any fighting on any of the battle fronts except artillery engagements and in none of these has any noteworthy achievement been recorded. Heavy bombardments have taken place in the Champagne region of France near St. Die, in the Voges Mountains, with the French the aggressors. The French guns also have shelled the town of Lens.

WERNER HORN HABEAS CORPUS PROCEEDINGS

Arguments Made in Federal Court of Appeals at Boston. Boston, Feb. 2.—The federal circuit court of appeals today heard arguments on the appeal in the habeas corpus proceedings filed by Werner Horn, who was indicted for illegally transporting dynamite in his attempt to blow up the international bridge at Yonkers, N. Y., on February 2, 1915. Horn has been in jail here since his habeas corpus petition was denied.

GERMAN PRIZE OF WAR

Indications Are That United States Will So Regard Her. Washington, Feb. 2.—Indications that the British passenger liner Appam brought into Hampton Roads by a German prize crew, will be held by the United States to be a German prize of war and not an auxiliary cruiser, were given out tonight in high official quarters.

GRANT INDEPENDENCE IN TWO TO FOUR YEARS

Provision is Made for Extension of Time for Granting Independence if the President Should Deem it Advisable Until Congress Shall Have Had an Opportunity to Further Consider the Subject--President May Reserve or Acquire Lands for Naval Bases and Coaling Stations Within the Territory of the Philippines--Five Republicans Voted for the Amendment--Measure Has Not Yet Passed the House.

GOVERNMENTAL CONTROL SHALL BE COMPLETED

and become absolute not less than two years nor more than four years from the date of the approval of this act, under the terms and in the manner hereinafter prescribed.

PRESIDENT VESTED WITH FULL POWERS

For the purpose of a complete and prompt compliance with this direction, the president is hereby invested with full power and authority to make such laws, regulations and orders as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this act.

MAY RETAIN NAVAL BASES

In any such settlement or adjustment so made in respect to the rights and claims of the United States against the said Philippines, the president may reserve or acquire such lands, rights and privileges as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this act.
