JOHN EDWARD TEIPER IS CHARGED WITH MATRICIDE

His Mother One of the Two Victims of Orchard Park Highway Tragedy

Buffalo, N. Y., Feb. 7.—John Edward Teiper was committed to the county jail today on a charge of murdering his mother, Mrs. Agnes M. Teiper, one of the two victims of the Orchard Park highway tragedy. The charge of murder in the first degree was made by District Attorney Wesley C. Dudley. Teiper's lawyer moved for an immediate examination but the district attorney claimed the two days allowed under the code and an adjournment until Wednesday was granted by the court. Bail for the prisoner was refused. Today's proceedings resulted merely in the laying of a formal charge against the prisoner, who has been in custody since the day following the double murder. He was not given an opportunity to plead. In the meantime all the evidence in the possession of the district attorney was being submitted to the grand jury, which is expected to make a special report on it tomorrow or Wednesday.

No improvement was noticeable today in the condition of Miss Grace J. Teiper, the prisoner's sister, who was badly injured when her mother and brother, Frederick, were slain.

MAKERS OF WOMEN'S GARMENTS HAVE COME TO TERMS

Threatened Strike of 15,000 Employees in New York Averted.

New York, Feb. 7.—Differences between the Ladies' Waist and Dress-makers Union and the Waist and Dress-makers Association, which some time ago threatened a strike of 15,000 employees, were virtually settled today by a board of arbitration, which made an award providing a previous protocol and allowing employees a 10 per cent. increase in wages.

The board consisted of Judge Julian W. Mack of Chicago; Robert Bruere, and Hamilton Holt, Judge Mack having recently taken the place of the late Judge D. Brandeis. The new protocol, which was accepted by both sides, fixes wages on an hourly instead of a weekly basis; full fledged cutters receive \$2.75 per week instead of \$25 and hours are reduced from 50 to 49 in six working days, with double pay for overtime. Minimum wages were fixed for piece workers. Other differences will be decided later.

RUMOR THAT VILLA BARGAINED WITH JAPAN

For an Invasion of the U. S. Through Lower California.

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 7.—Reports that General Francisco Villa had bargained with the Japanese government for an invasion of the United States through Lower California were disseminated today by Andrew G. Garcia, Mexican consul here. The rumors, which have been circulating since the downfall of the Villa government in northern Mexico were that documentary evidence of the alleged bargain had been found in Villa archives left in Juarez.

Consul Garcia stated he had no such documents in his possession and had no intention of asking the United States government to arrest a man in San Francisco an envoy of the former Villa government to Japan.

WESTERY WANTS CHEAPER LIGHTING

Town Council Asked to Petition Utilities Commission to Investigate Rates—Funeral of Mark F. Driscoll—Telephone Company Votes to Increase Stock—Armenian Relief Committee Formed.

After the formal opening of the monthly meeting of the Westery town council Monday, Frederick C. Buffum, representing the Westery Board of Trade, as chairman of the fire prevention committee, asked the council to appoint a committee of two to act with Herbert P. Clarke, chimney inspector, to prepare specifications for the construction of chimneys, with a view to have same adopted by the council and made mandatory on new construction. The matter was referred to Mr. Clark and Town Solicitor Argard.

Milk licenses were granted these six dealers: John Carey, Lillian P. Hill, E. M. Woods, Margaret Pickering, Peter S. Herdendorf and George W. Woodman. George Mintallo was granted licenses for three pool tables at 36 Canal street. A communication was received from Frank H. Bliven because his automobile was assessed for \$100, which he would be glad to sell for \$100. Referred to board of assessors. Michael Capalbo, asked for a street light on the Westery road, near the Peckham hollow. Referred to street light committee.

Frank W. Coy, chairman of the Board of Trade committee to confer with a like committee representing the Westery town council in the matter of seeking reduction of electric light rates, explained the justice of the proposition and asked that the council ask the public utilities commission to give the matter a public hearing in Westery. Frederick H. Buffum, Charles J. Butler, William Segar and Ira B. Crandall also advocated the adoption of the proposition, as citizens of Westery. On motion of Councilman Flynn, after a long discussion, it was voted that the joint committee prepare a formal complaint to be presented to the public utilities commission and ask for a hearing in Westery; but before the complaint is presented to the commission, Monday morning, at a special meeting of the council.

Chief of Police Thomas E. Brown reported 18 arrests in January, eight for intoxication, four for theft and three persons of unsound mind. Lewis Stanton, health officer, reported that there were no contagious diseases reported during the month. The petition for an addition electric light in Pond street was referred to the street light committee.

Councilman Francis G. Haswell of the highway committee made a partial report showing progress in regard to the rebuilding of the Watch Hill road. HENRY FORD HAS A NEW PEACE PLAN

Must Await Return of Party Before Telling of It.

Chicago, Feb. 7.—Henry Ford of Detroit, who sent a peace ship to Europe, has a new peace plan. "I would like to tell you about the new plan, but I must wait until my party has returned from Europe," said Mr. Ford today. He said he was perfectly satisfied with the results of his peace expedition.

Mr. Ford came here to attend a banquet given last night by the Michigan Society of Chicago. He said his new effort to bring the strife in Europe to an end would be on a larger scale than the Oscar II. expedition and that his recruits would be "personalities rather than personages."
