**GIVEN COMPENSATION FOR INJURIES WHILE WORKING**

Eight Agreements For Cases in East.

Six approved agreements under the workmen's compensation act were filed on Tuesday by Commissioner James J. Donohue with the clerk of the superior court. They were the following:

Thomas River Specialties Co. of Montville, employes and Paul Prickett, employee, right ankle sprained on Jan. 3; compensation \$7.20 per week during incapacity.

New London Ship and Engine Co. of Groton, employes, and Robert E. Cooper of New London, employe, pulled thumb on Jan. 8; compensation \$7.70 per week during disability.

Washburn Cotton Co. of Jewett City, employes, and John Myrwe, employe, toes cut and bone dislocated in right foot on Dec. 23; compensation \$5.56 during incapacity.

F. H. A. H. Chappell Co. of New London, employes, and John Foley of Groton, employe, fractured right wrist on Dec. 15; compensation \$5 per week during incapacity.

Rossie Velvet Co., Mystic, employes, and George John of Mystic, employe, lacerated right arm and side on Dec. 13; compensation \$6 per week during disability.

New England Collapsible Tube Co. of New London, employes, and Sidney Parker of West Mystic, employe, second finger of right hand lacerated and tip of bone amputated on Jan. 6; compensation \$6 per week during incapacity.

**SETTLED THE COSTS BETWEEN THEM**

Accused and Accused Were Taxed in City Court.

Clarence Osborne, 32 years of age, was before the city court on Monday morning, charged with intoxication. He was sent to the state infirmary for six months. It is said he has made friends in his home town and he told the court he was recently released from the Hartford jail.

Louis Spahr, faced Judge John H. Barnes on the charge of hitting Daniel E. Brown on the head with a snow shovel. The complaint was received by City Attorney John D. Hall Monday morning. He kept the warrant all day and about 5 o'clock gave it to the police to serve. In the court on Monday the complainant wanted to withdraw the case and said that Nelskin would pay for the warrant. Judge Barnes ordered the case tried and after hearing the facts ordered both user and accused to divide a full bill of costs between them. Each paid the sum of \$1.50.

Robert Frost, who was fined last week in the city court and who gave in order for his boss for the amount of his fine, was presented before Judge Barnes because the order was worthless. Frost owed his boss \$200 and he could not make the order which called for \$13.16. He was taken to jail by Policeman John Rice.

**COMPENSATION AWARD TO CAPTAIN'S WIDOW**

Mrs. Rebecca Randall of New London Has Paid For 312 Weeks.

At a hearing here on Monday before Compensation Commissioner James J. Donohue, Mrs. Rebecca Randall of New London was awarded compensation of \$9.20 for 312 weeks and \$100 burial expenses on the death of her husband Capt. George H. Randall. He was in the employ of the U. S. Southern Railway and was struck by a train on a vessel on Nov. 4 at Portland, Me. The amount the widow will receive in total will be \$2896.

Award of compensation was continued in the claim of James P. Malin against Arthur Fabrey of Springfield. The term of disability is yet to be determined. Meanwhile weekly compensation payments are to be made.

Compensation at the rate of \$5 per week for 275 weeks was given on the claim of John Embroth of Stafford against the Phoenix Woolen Co. of Stafford. He lost his right hand on Dec. 2. The lump sum he is to receive is \$1387.50.

Attendance in Grades for January Was 301.


Attendance records for the two schools for January showed that there was a per cent of attendance of 80.92 in the grades said 789 in the schools.

**BRAKEMAN STAPLETON HAD BACK BROKEN**

Petal Accident the First Time He Was Working as Night Brakeman—Report After Autopsy.

Coroner Franklin H. Brown has received the report from Medical Examiner Dr. C. C. Gildersleeve on the autopsy which was performed upon Brakeman Elmer Stapleton, whose death occurred on Feb. 8 after injuries received while working in the New Haven railroad yard here on the morning of Jan. 11.

The medical examiner found that the death of Mr. Stapleton was caused by a fractured vertebra and a peccatus. The night that he was fatally hurt was the first that he had spent to work as night brakeman and while climbing down a ladder at the side of a freight car he was struck by the standpipe between the tracks where the engines take water. He clung to the axle of the car and was dragged along until the train was stopped.
