

WESTERLY HEARS OF BIG VERDICT

Daniel J. Sully, Former Cotton King, Given Judgment for \$30,000 Against John Hays Hammond—Funeral of George G. Newall—Mrs. Susan Burrows, 70, Missing—Deaths, Mrs. Dexter M. Potter, Paul M. Main.

Daniel J. Sully three years ago, by reason of financial reverses converted Kenneth Ridge, his summer home at Watch Hill, into a modern hotel called the Sully.

Mr. Sully sued for \$1,500,000, virtually charging Hammond with libel and defamation in a controversy arising over the ownership of contracts of a newly patented cotton gin.

Mr. Sully was on the witness stand 27 consecutive days. He claimed that at the time he made contracts with the General Cotton Securities company for the sale of stock issued on the gin invention, Mr. Hammond was his partner, and that, later, by false and malicious statements as to his character and his connection with the company, Mr. Hammond prevented him from realizing the benefits of his contract.

On the witness stand Mr. Sully bitterly attacked Mr. Hammond's character for veracity and also his standing as an engineer, as did his lawyers and the verdict handed down Saturday afternoon in New York city.

Douglas Fairbanks, the actor, is son-in-law of the Sullys, and like them is well known in Westerly. Fairbanks is in the state in the movie fields of California and he does not intend to have his pals at the Lamb's in New York city forget him.

William S. McGuinness was adjudged guilty of intoxication by Judge Frank H. Hinckley at the Western county court on Saturday.


