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FIRST INTERLENTE SERVICE

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NEW LONDON WON IN DAMAGE SUIT

Jury Denied John W. Tripp's Claim for \$3,000 Damages.

Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock a jury in the superior court in New London returned with a verdict for the defendant in the case of John W. Tripp against the city of New London to recover damages for injury to his property by the changing of a grade in the laying of the waterworks in 1911. The suit was for \$3,000.

The jury was out about 45 minutes. Judge Milton A. Shaw was the presiding officer and the motion of the defendant to direct the verdict in the case.

The defendant introduced three witnesses Wednesday morning to show that the property had not been damaged by the change of grade. P. LeRoy Harwood, P. Hall Shurtz and Simon L. Ewald testified that in their opinion the property had not been damaged by the change of grade.

They were the last witnesses in the case when both sides rested. The corporation counsel William J. Brennan stated he would like to be heard on a motion to direct the verdict for the defendant.
