CONFIRMATION AT TRINITY CHURCH

Right Rev. E. Campion Acheson, Suffragan Bishop of the State, Confirmed Class of Six at Sunday Evening Service—Mission Week Services Brought to a Close.

At the closing of the mission week services in Trinity Episcopal church on Sunday evening a class of six was confirmed by Rt. Rev. E. Campion Acheson, suffragan bishop for the state of Connecticut. The mission week services opened last Monday evening and continued throughout the week with special preaching services each evening at one of the three Episcopal churches uniting in the mission. Holy communion was held each morning and on Thursday afternoon there was a special united service for the children of the three parishes at Trinity church. Sunday there were three confirmation services. The first was held in Christ church at 10 o'clock and at 2 o'clock in the afternoon a class of 14 was confirmed in St. Andrew's church, Greenville. Sunday evening the confirmation took place in Trinity church and the class numbered six.

Bishop Acheson took as his text I Peter, 2:5; Ye also, as living stones, are built up a spiritual house, to be a

holo priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God through Jesus Christ.

GAME BIRDS DIE; LACK OF FOOD

Feathered Creatures Suffering Greatly From the Cold and Continued Snow.

From all sections of the state reports are received that quail and other birds which inhabit the woods and underbrush are dying from want of food.

DECISION RESERVED IN SUIT AGAINST ASSESSOR

George W. Peabody Charged With Obtaining Money Under False Pretenses.

The case of the town of Waterford against George W. Peabody, an assessor of the town, to recover costs, double the amount alleged to have been obtained from the town under false pretenses, was heard Saturday in the Superior court.

The suit was tried at 11:30 o'clock before Justice of the Peace Oscar Dimmock in the town hall in Jordan. Because of the prominence of the defendant and the nature of the suit, a large number of townspeople were in the town hall and listened to the case.

Justice Dimmock reserved his decision.

Civil Service Exams.

The following examinations under the direction of the United States civil service commission will be held in New Haven, Middlebury and Hartford in this state as follows, April 4, assistant biologist, male, salary \$2,000, applicants to be between 25 and 45 years old; April 11, aeronautical engineer, salary \$2,600, applicants to be more than 20 years old; April 12-13, computer and estimator, male, salary \$1,800, applicants to be more than 20 years old; April 12-13, scientific assistant in dairy manufacturing for men or women, salary \$1,200, applicants to be more than 18 years old; April 15, assistant petroleum engineer, male, salary \$1,800-\$2,500, applicants to be between 21 and 40 years old; April 15, electrical inspector, male, salary \$2,700, applicants to be 18 years old or over; and April 19-20, domestic science teacher, female, salary \$2,700, applicants to be between 20 and 50 years old.

Over \$500 For German Relief. Herwig lodge, Sons of German, New London, raised \$57.05 from the recent concert and ball for German war sufferers. Of this amount \$200 has been contributed to the aid of the German widow and orphans of the same amount for the widows and orphans of Austria-Hungary, \$100 for the physicians' expedition from this country, \$10 has been sent to the relief bureau and the remainder will be retained in the treasury to be distributed as occasion demands.
