NORTHWARD ADVANCE OF CROP-PLANTING. Causes Farmers to be Busy in April as Far North as Canadian Border.

Washington, April 13.—The northward advance of corn planting from the extreme southern portions of the country to the Canadian border causes farmers to be busily engaged during April.

Vienna, April 13.—A decree has been issued here that any attempt to remove it might cause the entire mass to push farther into the main channel and bring with it a much larger mass immediately back of it.

Planting of early potatoes by early April has usually spread nearly as far northward as the planting of corn at the close of April and during the month reaches to the extreme northern portion of the United States.

Seeding of spring wheat in an average season is done during March in Iowa, Nebraska and most of South Dakota, and during April the seeding under normal conditions is carried on in all of North Dakota, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, and Upper Michigan.

Seeding of spring oats is usually going on in April from Southern New York and Pennsylvania, North-Central Ohio, and Northern Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, and Nebraska northward nearly to the Canadian border west of the lake region, and to North-Central New York and Southern Vermont and Maine in the eastern part.

Cotton planting begins in an average in extreme southern Texas about March 1 and by the close of that month it has advanced normally to sections as far north as Central Texas, Mississippi, Alabama, and North-Central Georgia.
