



WHAT OUR CITY NEEDS MOST

Grangers Hear Views of Prominent Citizens—Interesting Programme by Lecturer—Three Applications for Membership.

What Our City Needs Most was the topic of the meeting of Norwich Grange, No. 72, Patrons of Husbandry, in Pythian hall on Wednesday evening, and various opinions were aired by several prominent Norwich gentlemen.

The meeting was called to order by the Worthy Master, Charles A. Hagberg and opened in regular form. Three applications for membership were received and business of a routine nature was transacted.

The lecturer's programme was one of the best yet. It included discoveries by the D. E. F. G.'s, (those whose last names begin with either W or H) and a number of possible and short addresses on What Our City Needs Most.

Following the discoveries came the lecture on the history of the city, being a brief history of Norwich. When was Norwich purchased from the Indians, asked the lecturer. On June 17, 1714 it was a territory of two acres and the purchase price was 70 pounds. The first mayor Benjamin Huntington, was elected in July 1874 and his office for twelve years.

The expense of Unco's monument was borne by the ladies of Norwich and was erected in the Indian cemetery in 1842. It was made of Quincy granite at the Massachusetts State Prison, Charlestown. The corner stone of the monument was laid by the city for twelve years ago here with part of his cabinet while making a tour of the eastern states.

There was no postoffice in Norwich until 1842. The postoffice was distributed from the New London postoffice. The Norwich post office was established in 1872 and the mails were carried three or four times a week by stage routes.

Following the lecturer's introduction a poem, My Town, was given by Mrs. Elsie Jacobs. The topic of the evening was then in order and the first speaker was Judge John H. Barnes. Judge Barnes, in his remarks, said that Norwich does not need is brotherly love, the practice of fraternal love, and to stop knocking.

Worthy Master Charles A. Hagberg was the second speaker. He said we should get rid of the saloon, should work for the abolition of the saloon, and that Norwich needs the Rose of New England.

Rev. Joel B. Slocum, D. D., pastor of the Central Baptist church, was the third speaker. He said that the subject of the evening, among the several things Rev. Dr. Slocum advocated was a cleaner city.

Miss Alice Jacobs, who was introduced by giving a poem, The Little Old Town and Herbert R. Branche followed with a poem Might as Well be Happy. The lecturer read the following paper on What It Means to Amount to Something and Be a Credit to the Town.

"An amount to something" a person must be, in a measure at least, successful in some honest occupation.
