of any tight corner into which he may be driven. He also has dynamite in his possession, and the circumstances may dictate to his maniacal mind. He is familiar with the country through which he was engaged Tuesday in making his escape. The country that miles of woodland and rough and sparsely settled territory—so his chances for getting away were better than even, notwithstanding that automobiles, motorcycles and other vehicles were covering every road and the number of police dogs from Henri I. Bauer's kennel kept him closely seeking to pick up his trail. Telephone messages sent out in all directions were the means of putting officers in many Rhode Island and Massachusetts towns on the watch for him.

Unrequited Love Inspired Crimes. Elliott's crime was a hideous one. It was inspired by unrequited love. His advances were not received with favor by Miss Pettis, and it has developed since the crime was committed, he deliberately set out to take her life and, as it proved, that of any other persons who interfered with his plans.

Elliott Lying In Wait. At 4.30 Tuesday morning Mr. Pettis, aged 56, came down from his sleeping apartment on the second floor of a pretty little home there set in the midst of fine farming country and went out into a wood house, attached to the dwelling, to get some kindlings with which to start the kitchen fire.

Exactly what happened there will never be known, but the theory as pieced together from the statements and investigations makes it appear reasonable that Elliott was lying in wait. The back door of the shed, opening toward the east, was not locked and it is believed that Elliott either waited inside the shed, where he may have been in the light, or in through that door when he heard Mr. Pettis coming down stairs.

Immediately Opened Fire. In any event, Elliott immediately opened fire, using two automatic revolvers. The first shot struck Elliott almost immediately wounded in the right arm, beat a hasty retreat, slamming shut behind him a door leading into a little room with a desk and a cream separator. He either tried to hold this door or to hook it against Elliott's entrance, but the holes made by four bullets did not succeed in hooking it, however, and from there retreated through other doorways and into the kitchen, where he was wounded at the time. It is shown, by blood flecks on one of the doors, so his progress was sufficiently slow to allow Elliott to follow him through the rear door of the shed and around to the north side of the house, from where he fired a series of bullets with bullets, firing him through the kitchen window, as the wounded man was making his way toward the stairs leading to his room above.

Mr. Pettis sprang up as her husband grabbed his rifle and again left the room. Then Mrs. Pettis heard a series of six or eight shots and in the midst of the excitement, Miss Sybil, her step-daughter, came staggering into the room, sat on the bed and said: "Mother, John has shot me."
