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NORWICH FIFTY YEARS AGO

Death of Veteran of War of 1812—Col. Charles Coit Nominated for Postmaster at Local Office—Connecticut Volunteers Return Home.

Fifty years ago one of the buildings belonging to the Hayward Rubber Co. in Colchester caught fire and was entirely consumed. The loss was approximately \$15,000.

Col. Charles Coit was nominated to the senate for the postmaster of the local office. The last of the Connecticut volunteers returned home, some half dozen belonging in this city.

May 7, 1866—Rueben Cook, a veteran of the War of 1812 died in Preston, Sunday, aged 87 years. Mr. Cook was one of the oldest inhabitants of the town, celebrated the 60th anniversary of his birth in 1806.

Stimson E. Rudd died at the residence of his son, Hazelard Rudd, at Norwich, on Saturday. Mr. Rudd was a descendant of the sixth generation of William Hyde, one of the original settlers of Norwich, was born Sept. 1, 1788.

May 8, 1866—The regular monthly meeting of the board of common council was held Friday evening. It was voted to accept a proposition made by Henry Allen to widen Main street from the old Mess Buckingham place to the Merchants hotel building.

At a meeting of the field officers of the first and third regiments, Connecticut National Guard, held at the residence of Mr. Charles H. Prentice of Hartford, of the first regiment, was elected Brigadier General.

May 8, 1866—The last Connecticut volunteers returned Norwich. Some half dozen or more belonged in this city. They were quietly dropped after four years' absence.

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THINKS HER HUSBAND HAS STOLEN CHILD.

Mrs. Robert W. Chesbro of Waterford Says Four Year Old Was Taken From Boarding House.
