LEGAL NOTICES

LEGAL NOTICE
AUTOMOBILE TRAFFIC
On account of the large number of automobiles passing through the city streets at the present time, many extra jitneys being in use, notice is hereby given that the laws regulating speed of motor vehicles must be observed and will be strictly enforced.

PERSONS operating such vehicles will take notice that, amongst other provisions, the law prescribes that upon approaching an intersecting highway, curve, street corner or schoolhouse when children are going to or returning from school, a timely signal by bell or horn must be given and the vehicle must slow down and that persons operating such cars at the intersection of streets shall keep to the right of the intersection of the center of both highways when turning to the right, and pass to the right of the intersection of the centers of such highways before turning to the left.

Speed must at all times be reasonable and proper, having regard to the width, traffic and present use of the highway.

For any first offense, the punishment may be a fine up to one hundred dollars or imprisonment not more than ten days, and for a second offense, a fine up to five hundred dollars or imprisonment not more than six months or both.

Officers of the law will see that all traffic regulations are enforced.
