Plattsburgh, N. H., June 5.—Every state in the union is represented among the 1,700 men who have already arrived at the first Plattsburgh camp of military instruction, which opened here today.

Automobile parties from as far west as Chicago and from various sections in the east preceded the first big influx today when the New York delegation, 510 strong, arrived in 20 Pullman sleepers. Seven hundred men sat down to breakfast in the mess tent, and at noon the number of student soldiers on the grounds had increased to nearly 1,700, which included the Boston delegation of about 400.
