

WILL HAVE 1200 BOYS AT CAMP

Enrollments for Military Training at Fort Terry Are Coming in Fast.

Enrollments for the boys' military camp, opening July 6 at Fort Terry, Plum Island, N. Y., are coming in fast and at this rate the first camp of 1,200 boys will soon be complete and a second may have to be started.

Plum Island is 13 miles southwest of New London and nine from Greenport on Long Island, and is five miles long. It is a government reservation reached only by government boats and not open to the public.

There will be a hospital tent with attendants, a hospital tent will attend to minor cases, and the regular post hospital, which is modern in equipment, will take care of anything more serious.

The daily routine will be adapted to these immature recruits so that they will not be overtaxed. Reveille will be at 6, with ten minutes of calisthenics and breakfast at 6.30.

The type of training will be tentative, as follows: Infantry training, school of the soldier, company, and battalion, in close and extended order—the latter to include preliminaries in minor tactics and compact exercises—coast artillery training, small arms practice, including gallery and range practice; this to follow the special class A as prescribed for coast artillery and for which a badge of proficiency in marksmanship will be issued.

Various sports and recreations will fill up the free hours. There are several tennis courts, a nine-hole golf course, boat races, and a swimming pool. The boys will be encouraged to take charge of the work of the camp.
