

## Westerly Favors Sewerage System

Legislative Act Approved by Majority of 74—Barbers Effect Organization and Fix New Prices—Notes.

There was a special town election in Westerly Tuesday on the question of sewerage. The issue has been raised to a more or less extent for the past quarter century. At the last session of the general assembly an act was passed giving the town authority to construct and maintain a system of sewerage within what is termed in the act the first drainage district, which comprised the compact town, and practically the Westerly fire district. The act also provided that the cost of construction and maintenance must be borne by the taxpayers of the district to be benefited, and in consequence theseing property outside the district had no financial interest in the proposition. There was demand for referendum and the wise legislators decided in favor of the referendum. The act also provided that all taxpayers qualified to vote on money expenditures in the town were also fully qualified to vote on this first drainage district question, whether they owned property within or without the district.

ROOSEVELT CONFERS WITH PROGRESSIVE LEADERS. Future Course of the Party Was Discussed—Perkins Issues Statement.

New York, June 13.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt had a conference here tonight with George W. Perkins, Governor Hiram W. Johnson, Oscar S. Strauss and Chester H. Rowell of California to discuss the future course of the progressive party. His tentative refusal of the presidential nomination and the advisability of having some one else named in his stead as a candidate by the national executive committee of the party were considered.

Colonel Roosevelt would not talk for publication on what took place at the conference, but Mr. Perkins issued the following statement: "All members of the progressive party and its organization should remember that at the close of the progressive convention in Chicago, a meeting of the national committee was called to be held in Chicago, June 26, a week from next Monday. This will be after the democratic convention at St. Louis and the result of that convention will be known."

Sufficient time will have elapsed after the progressive, republican and democratic conventions to allow our commitment in each state to learn in a general way the public sentiment in each of the states and to bring this information to the meeting of our committee. The action which will then be taken by our committee, on June 28 should be awaited by progressives as individuals and by the various local and state organizations. No action should be taken by individuals, progressives, or by the various organizations until the action of the national committee has been made public."

Mr. Perkins said that this message, in substance, had been sent tonight by telegraph to the members of the national committee and to the state chairmen.

Colonel and Mrs. Roosevelt came to the city today from Oyster Bay to meet their son, Kermit and his wife, who are returning from Panama on the United States transport Klipsack, which is due at quarantine tonight, but which will not dock until tomorrow. After he greets his son tomorrow, Colonel Roosevelt will confer at his office with Raymond Robinson, who was chairman of the progressive convention, and Harold C. Hoke, progressive national committeeman from Illinois.
